Montague To Open New Room For Grade Eight

A special meeting of the Canadian Legion, Montague branch, was held last evening at the hall, with Comrade R. MacGregor, presiding. Brought before the meeting was the renting of the hall as a classroom. Mr. Les MacLeod, secretary of the Montague School Board, explained that at present there were approximately 275 students in a nine-room school which warranted the opening of another room owing to the crowded conditions which exist. He stated that it was expedient to move grade eight to another location, and that the Legion hall would fulfill requirements.

It was moved by Comrade E. MacKinnon that the hall be rented to the school to provide fuel and light. Other details were to be worked out by the school board and the executive of the Legion. Comrade R. Martin informed the members that Comrade J. S. DesRoches had consented to take over the chairmanship of the Legion carnival, and assisted by Comrade J. M. Clair would also look after the advertising and publicity. A committee including Comrades E. MacKinnon, D. McGowan, and A. Sullivan was appointed to select committees for the various duties connected with the successful operation of the carnival.

Teachers Convention Held At Souris

Fifty-five teachers from Inspectorate No. 7 and officials from the Department of Education assembled at St. Mary's Convent Hall, Souris, on Monday, September 10, for their annual fall convention. The meeting was called to order by the President, Miss Helen F. MacLacac. Enrollment then followed. The minutes of the 1950 fall convention were read by the Secretary, Miss Mary Keays. Following the minutes, the local President, Miss MacLacac, read a most interesting and inspiring address. In her report, Miss MacLacac pointed out that 1951 was a memorable year for the Prince Edward Island Teachers' Federation in its being host to the Canadian Teachers' Federation for its annual conference. She also vividly showed how education stretches into the home, the school, the church, the community, commerce and industry, labor and especially government.

Mr. Daniel MacDonal, representative on the Board of Governors of the Prince Edward Island Teachers' Federation, outlined briefly the work of the Federation in endeavoring to obtain a raise in salary for teachers. Mr. Harold J. Hynes, supervisor of Inspectorate No. 7, pointed out that though there were only a few schools closed in his Inspectorate, there were, as yet, a good many permit teachers. He also advised teachers concerning notices of engagement, attendance reports, report cards, school property, etc. Miss Marie E. Bowness, director of the Prince Edward Island Division of Junior Red Cross, outlined work of Junior Red Cross, its importance in developing good health habits in the regular school program.

Mr. Frank Ross, a teacher who has been extremely active in the teaching profession for some time and who taught in the Model School, Prince of Wales College, gave a most informative talk on literature and English in general. She demonstrated clearly the integral role of English in every subject, every grade.

Afternoon Session Mr. Malcolm MacKenzie, chief supervisor of schools, outlined the efforts of the Department of Education in securing a reasonable subvention for textbooks in this Province. Much discussion followed on the present revised school curriculum. Mr. Edward MacPhail, described the necessity of punctual school attendance of pupils which would avoid a great deal of confusion in the Department of Education and more especially at the Family Allowance Office. Rev. Sister St. Elizabeth, C. N. D. prepared and delivered a report on principles of problem solving in arithmetic. She also outlined several steps and sug-
