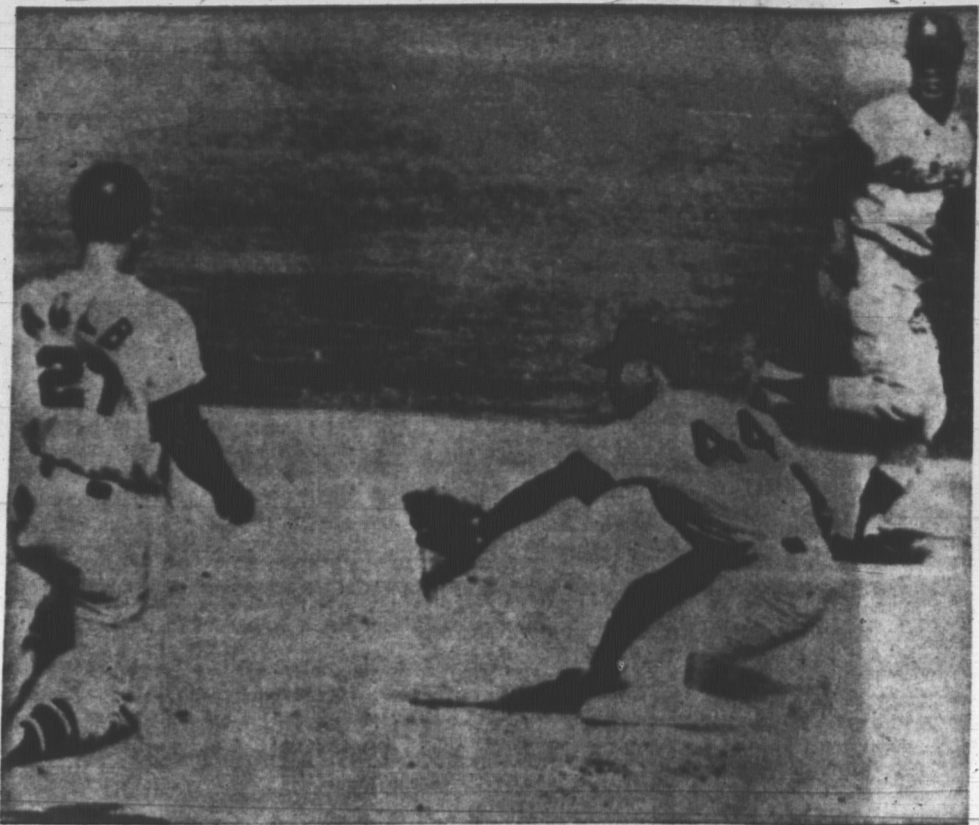

Hodge Out For 3rd Game; Earnie Wakely Called Up

MONTREAL (CP) - Tiny Charlie Hodge, Montreal's first-string goalie, remained behind in hospital Monday as the high-flying Canadiens enroute for Toronto and the third game of their Stanley Cup semi-final playoff.

Hodge, a steady, if unspectacular performer in the Hab's two victories over the Leafs here last week, was sidelined with a groin injury and was officially declared out of tonight's game.

Veteran Gump Worsley, who shared the goaltending job with Hodge during the last half of the regular National Hockey League season, will make his first playoff appearance for the Canadiens as Hodge's replacement.

Coach Toe Blake said there was no indication yet how seriously Hodge was injured and thus he could not say whether the goalie might rejoin the team in time for Thursday's fourth game in Toronto.

Hodge was injured in the first period Saturday night, but, except for a brief trip to the Canadiens' bench, played out the rest of the contest without any apparent difficulty. Montreal won the game 3-1 after taking Thursday night's opener by a 3-2 margin.

Worsley, the ex-New York Ranger who will be 35 next month, allowed 50 goals in 18 games during the regular schedule for a 2.78 goals-per-game average. Hodge finished with a 2.60 mark.

To give them a second goalie for the third game, Canadiens announced they have called up Earnie Wakely from Quebec Aces of the American League. He will remain with the team until Hodge returns to active duty.

Apart from the surprise Hodge development, Blake said the team would invade Maple Leaf Gardens in good shape. The Montreal coach said the effectiveness of Canadiens' power play has increased since the return of Bobby Rousseau to top form. Blake said that, apart from the inspired play of team captain Jean Beliveau in the playoffs and second half of the season, Rousseau's return to form has been a key factor in boosting the Hab's confidence.

"That combined with the fact our penalty-killing has improved have been the two main differences," Blake said.

Licari's RCAF Eagles Trounce Borden Nats. Playing within the confines of their own rink, Tony Licari's RCAF Eagles last night trounced Borden Nationals 9-5 to square their best of seven Prince County Hockey League final series at 2-1.

The Eagles had captured the opening game of the series in their home rink and then dropped the second two encounters to the Nationals here at Civic Stadium.

George Buffett was the only player to score more than one goal in the 14-goal barrage last night, pacing the Airmen with a pair. Other markers for the Eagles went to Tucker, Martin, Prang, Guy, MacDonald and playing coach Licari.

Imlach Forgets Cliches In Meeting With The Press

TORONTO (CP)—Punch Imlach forgot the usual pre-game cliches when he met with newspaper men Monday after his Toronto Maple Leafs sweated through a 14-hour workout.

His cap tilted back in a jaunty manner, the Leaf coach gave little evidence his defending Stanley Cup champions are on the threshold of elimination from their best-of-seven semi-final with Montreal Canadiens after losing the first two games of the series.

Imlach got onto a subject far removed from current problems—lacrosse.

He was given the out by a visitor from Quebec City whom he had coached in minor lacrosse. It was also in Quebec City that Imlach played and coached with the Aces of the old Quebec Senior League for 11 years prior to coming to the Leafs in 1958.

"You might say that's where I got my start in coaching," he said.

Imlach himself was a better-than-average lacrosse player and recalled some memorable clashes he had with Red Storey, one of Canada's best-known players who became one of the National Hockey League's top referees.

"It's a real, tough game... that lacrosse."

A really outstanding NHL team, he feels, could have been developed from lacrosse players of that era "if some of those guys could have laced on a pair of skates."

The rules of lacrosse, not far removed from hockey, have enabled several athletes to carve a niche for themselves in professional hockey.

Among the current crop is John Ferguson, Montreal's strongman who has given the Toronto team cause to appreciate the rudiments of lacrosse during the current season.

Imlach expressed a note of optimism. "All we've got to do is win these home games. If we go back to Montreal even... watch out. They (Canadians) know it. It'll be the difference between night and day."

The return of Kent Douglas to the Leaf lineup after a one-game suspension following his stick-swinging duel with Montreal's Dave Balon in the series' opener should spark Toronto's offense.

"He's the anchor of our power-play," said Imlach of the 23-year-old Douglas who was assessed a match penalty on the play and an automatic \$100 fine. Imlach has a lot of faith in the Cobalt, Ont., native who has been a point man on the Toronto power play for two years.

Monday he had Bobby Pulford working with Eddie Shack and Tim Horton on what observers feel will be the Toronto muscle line to soften up Montreal's fast-skating forwards.

This was a line Imlach considered using in the Leafs' second game but he was forced to revise his lineup when Douglas was suspended an Horton had to drop back to his usual defensive slot with Allan Stanley.

Pulford, hampered with a groin injury sustained just prior to the end of the season, was listed as a definite starter by Imlach who feels the talented Leaf centre is "100 per cent ready."

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Sydney Post Juniors Defeat Legionnaires

SYDNEY (CP) - Sydney Cape Breton Post Juniors Monday night defeated Summerside, P.E.I. Legionnaires 4-2 to capture the Maritime Junior Hockey Championship here before a crowd of more than 3,000.

Sydney took the best-of-three series in straight games. They won the opening game at Summerside Saturday night 5-4.

Summerside - last year's Maritime champions - jumped into an early lead on a goal by Paul MacWilliams at 2:24 of the first period. But Sydney's John Mulvihill tied it at 1-1 before the period ended.

There was no scoring in the second period.

Ivan Baglow gave Summerside the lead for the second time in the game at 3:33 of the final period. Then Sydney struck for three quick goals.

Bobby Leyte, Joey Andrea and Blair Joseph all scored for the Post in less than six minutes.

Gary Sommers made 29 saves in the Summerside nets, several of them outstanding. Mike Novak handled 17 for Sydney.

HABS GET 4 GOALS Canadiens-Toronto Power Play Series

By BILL NEVILLE MONTREAL (CP) - Two games don't make a series, but the Montreal - Toronto Stanley Cup semi-final is beginning to shape up as a battle of power plays.

Canadiens have been producing with the man advantage, Maple Leafs haven't, and that explains a large part of Montreal's 2-0 lead after the first two games of the best-of-seven series.

A look at the statistics of the opening games here Thursday and Saturday shows that Canadiens scored four of their goals in 3-2 and 3-1 victories while they enjoyed a man-over advantage.

Toronto, on the other hand, still is looking for its first power play goal of the series.

Both of last week's games provided plenty of opportunity as far as power plays were concerned. There were 26 penalties in the opener and 19 Saturday.

CHANCES NEARLY EVEN In two games, Canadiens have had a manpower advantage 15 times for a total of some 31 minutes. Leafs have had 13 chances totalling about 25 minutes.

If the chances have been relatively even, however, the results haven't.

In Thursday's opener, Henri Richard got Canadiens' opening goal with Toronto's Tim Horton sitting out a five-minute major in the first period. The same Horton was off again in the final stanza when Bobby Rousseau scored Montreal's third and deciding goal.

In between, Ralph Backstrom of Montreal and Toronto's Dickie Moore and Carl Brewer scored while neither side enjoyed an advantage.

SAME STORY It was much the same story Saturday with Montreal's Claude Proost opening the scoring with two Leafs off and Jean Beliveau getting the game-winner on another Montreal power play.

Richard's second goal of the series and Toronto's lone marker by Ron Ellis came with both sides at full strength.

Both teams are using roughly the same personnel on power plays as they did during the regular National Hockey League season.

Canadiens have used a baste power play alignment of Beliveau at centre, Provoost and either Richard or Yvon Cournoyer on the wings and Jacques Lapierre and Rousseau at the points.

B. Sinclair was the top marker for the Seabrooks in their one-sided win over Long River with four goals with A. Sinclair and B. MacEwen getting a pair each. L. Kelly tallied the other marker for Kensington.
