

Unloading 500 Tons Cement Here

The M.V. Carlisle Bay, Captain C. H. Melanson, with home port of Weymouth, N.S., was the first vessel to enter Charlottetown Harbor since the spring breakup. She is tied up at the Railway Wharf, unloading a cargo of 500 tons of cement from Cornerbrook, New Brunswick, and will load a general cargo in return to that place, including five tons of hay, three tons of feed and 9,000 bags of potatoes. It is expected that the "Carlisle Bay" will be engaged in the Newfoundland trade for the most of the summer, since the demand for cement in this Province in the near future will be great.

Also tied up at the Railway Wharf is the smaller motor vessel "Maid of Clare" loading a general cargo for the Magdalen Islands.

Showing Maritime Artist's Work At Art Center

A collection of 25 paintings by a contemporary Maritime artist Goodridge Roberts are on display at the Art Center, Market Build- ing. The exhibition is touring the Maritimes and will be in Char- lottetown until April 24, sponsored by the Maritime Art Association. It includes mostly landscapes, although there are portraits and still-life compositions as well. The artist uses low-key tones, particu- larly in his landscapes. One oil painting, "View of Montreal from Pine Avenue" is a study of that cosmopolitan city showing an artistic perspective achieved through varying shades of the off-tones. A sensitive portrait of a young school girl, "Flora", is done in off-pink pastels. As well there are a few scenic watercolors such as "Laur- entian Hillsides".

A graduate of Fredericton, N. B., High School Mr. Roberts has won many prizes and for the past 17 years he has held exhibitions in museums and universities across Canada. He has been awarded a Canadian Government fellowship and left in November to spend a year in France. He comes from a family distinguished in Canadian culture, including such names as Sir Charles G. D. Roberts and Bliss Carman.

Toronto Nurses Forgo Pay Boost

TORONTO, (CP)—Toronto pri- vate-duty nurses have decided to do something about the high cost of living—they voted down a daily \$2 pay increase for themselves. It was proposed at the annual meeting of the Central Registry of Graduate Nurses that daily wages be raised to \$12 from \$10. The proposal was turned down on the ground it would place a heavier financial burden on pa- tients. The registry represents more than 1,000 private nurses.

Mr. Jean Brown, registrar-general of the central registry, said the nurses felt that the average pa- tient just can't afford to pay more for nursing services.
