"No woman who is honest with herself can now escape an equal responsibility of citizenship. Canada needs women who today have clear-eyed dreams of national greatness and a knowledge of the means to make them come true."

Mrs. B. Eric MacDonnell, assistant secretary of the P.E.I. Chapter of the IODE said during her address at the annual meeting held Saturday at the Charlottetown Hotel.

"These women should be able to have vision which extends beyond the confines of the home to government, welfare, education and every phase of nation building, and at the same time carry on their responsibilities to the home and their families," Mrs. MacDonnell went on to say.

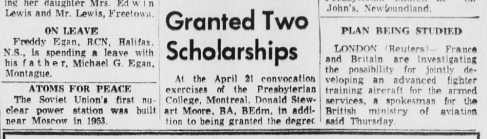
