

S'side Marks Observance Of "Credit Union Day"

The three credit unions in Summerside, last evening marked the observance of Credit Union Day by sponsoring a banquet which was addressed by Rev. George Topshée of Sydney, director of adult urban education for the extension department of St. Francis Xavier University.

Mr. Wm. A. Currie, a director of Community Credit Union, presided at the meeting which was held in Howard's Restaurant, with about 60 persons in attendance.

Mr. Currie referred to the organization of St. Paul's Credit Union—the first in Summerside—followed by the organization of Trinity Credit Union in 1924 and that of the most recent, the Community Credit Union, in November of last year.

He said that today there are throughout the Province, some 38 credit unions with a membership of almost 10,000 persons, and assets of over one million dollars.

He said that these Credit Unions have loaned more than five million to their members, and while many of these people might not be in a position to get loans from chartered banks, the loss of only 1/7 of 1 percent spoke very highly for Credit Union members and the officers they had selected.

Before calling on Mr. Leo Corcoran, assistant managing director of the P. E. I. Credit Union League, to introduce Rev. Father Topshée, the chairman introduced, among others present, Henry W. Wedge, Mayor of Summerside; Cyrus Forrier, president of St. Paul's Credit Union; W. Stevens, president of Trinity Credit Union; George Chappell, president of the Community Credit Union.
