THE regular monthly meeting of the School Board was held last evening. The teachers reports show the enrollment for the past month to be 1286—Boys 729; Girls 558; The percentage of attendance in each of the city schools was 90—There were 128 cases of tardiness, 6 cases of truancy and 8 cases of corporal punishment. Teachers made 124 visits and sent 28 notices to parents. There were 136 requests to leave school before the regular hour for closing and 97 fell below the grading average. After some desultory discussion about the continuance of the Manual Training school, the establishing of a school of Domestic Science, and the system of conducting the savings bank in the schools the meeting adjourned.

A VERY successful convention of the South King's Sunday School District, was held in the Presbyterian Church, at Peter's Road Friday afternoon and evening. Nine schools were represented and interest was manifested in the work. Rev. Ewen Gillies of Murray Harbor South, delivered a very able and instructive address on "How to Make Lessons Attractive." Geo. Moore of Murray River read an excellent paper on "Difficulties in School Work." At the evening meeting the attendance was much larger than at the afternoon session. The president of the district, E. G. Gedding, presided. W. H. Bears delivered an address of welcome to the delegates, which was responded to by A. E. McLeod, of Glenwilliam. Miss A. E. Horton, of Murray River, read a most interesting paper on "Dangers that beset the youth of our land." The reader referred to the drink, cigarette, smoking and loafing habits, and the use of profane language, as among the many great dangers which imperil our children. The Field Secretary, Rev. G. P. Raymond, gave an open conference on Sunday school work. Among the features of the evening meeting was a duet by Mrs. Morrison, organist of the church, and Isaac Beers.

Fruit of sympathy and instantly musical, her interpretation was most artistic. In the lullaby which ensued after a vociferous encore she gave evidence of a sweetness that contrasted well with the more robust quality of voice demanded in the first song. Her success at the service in Gounod's "O Divine Redeemer," was amply sustained and enhanced by her work of last evening. The church reports followed and were matters for congratulations between pastor, officials and members of the congregation. Dainty refreshments closed out a very pleasant evening. Hake here is a failure caused partially or wholly by the dog-fish pest, which is still with us. The numbers and capacity of this fish has become a serious matter to our fishermen, as they are certainly increasing each year in these waters, as well as on the southern coast of Nova Scotia in the Bay of Fundy and on the fishing grounds of Sable Island. While there is a balance of power among the inhabitants of the deep, the bigger devouring the smaller, and man assisting in maintaining the equilibrium, there is nothing to lessen the numbers of the dog-fish. Man has no use for him, all the edible fishes are repelled by his unwelcome presence, and no other resident of the ocean can make use of his ugly body and leathery skin.—One by one our people are getting south for the winter, some for the first time, some returning. Michael Whelan and George Jarvis, Miss Flossie Rose and Mrs. Edmund Baker, went recently.—Mrs. Ada Bruce has arrived home.—Mrs. Ezra Fraser died on the 2nd inst, leaving six children, one an infant two weeks old.—Our eastern cheese took high rank at the exhibition, and the Red Point Factory, though a small one, is to be congratulated on the standard attained largely through the skill of the cheese maker, John J. Smith.
