ALL RIGHT.—The schooner "Minnie R. McKenzie," reported lost with all hands a short time ago, is all safe in Victoria.

WE are pleased to see that Mr. Henry A. Harvie is about to open his library again. The public have felt the want of a library since its close.

ASHORE.—The barque "Amity," of St. John, from Montevideo to Richibucto, has gone ashore at Cape Tormentine. She did not get off as yet.

DIVINE SERVICE.—Rev. Mr. Goldsmith will hold divine service in Upper Prince Street Methodist Church tomorrow, at 10.30 a.m.; Rev. G. Steel, at 6.30 p.m.

THE steamer Acadia arrived from Boston yesterday with a large cargo of merchandise. There were no passengers. She will sail to-day, at 12 o'clock.

BLACKFISH.—Six large blackfish are reported to have passed up the East River yesterday forenoon. A small one of those fish went ashore at Pownal on Tuesday last.

Tax Orangemen held a mass meeting in Montreal, the 24th, and passed resolutions condemning the Grand Jury, and calling on Protestants to raise as one man and demand a change in the law.

The whale was, yesterday, towed from the Ferry Wharf and hauled up in Mr. Henry Hales' boathouse, on Steam Navigation Wharf. He is now on exhibition, and can be seen for the small sum of ten cents. Proceeds for the poor.

THE assessed value of the property in Toronto is now fifty million dollars. The funded debt of the city, including the cost of the water-works, is now six millions. The increase in the value of property is two millions for the year.

YESTERDAY there was a large and active market. Butter (fresh) sold at from 24 to 26 cents per pound; eggs from 17 to 18 cents per dozen; beef (small pieces) from 8 to 14 cents per pound; pork from 5 1/2 to 6 1/2 cents per pound; and potatoes from 20 to 25 cents per bushel.

INSUBORDINATION.—The barque "George Peake" arrived off Point Prim yesterday. Captain Carew came up in the "Henry Aitken," and last evening laid an information in the Stipendiary Magistrate's office against seven of his crew for insubordination.

At the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court yesterday morning, John Downing was fined \$1 costs or four days for being drunk and incapable. Neil McLeod appeared on a charge of selling liquor without license. Two witnesses were examined, but the evidence was not strong, and it stands over till to-day. Sarah Eden, for the same, was fined \$16 22.

THROUGH RATES.—C. J. Brydges and William McKechnie, Esquires, were here on Saturday last arranging matters in connection with winter communication by the steamer "Northern Light." We learn they have opened up through rates from all points on the Intercolonial and P. E. Island Railways—the steamer forming the connection between this port and Pictou. This will be an advantage that cannot fail to be appreciated by the travelling public, as they will not be subjected to any delay, on account of the facilities of the Railway Wharf, where both steamer and train can come within a few feet of each other. In the event of the steamer being unable to make her way close up to the wharf, a contract has been entered into with Mr. Michael Flynn, of this town, to provide a suitable express for the conveyance of mails and passengers to and from the Railway Station House. The latter also received the contract of carrying coal to steamer. The only and most important provision we are now aware of is the selection of a competent and courageous crew of officers and men, and who will do their utmost to enjoy public confidence.—G. 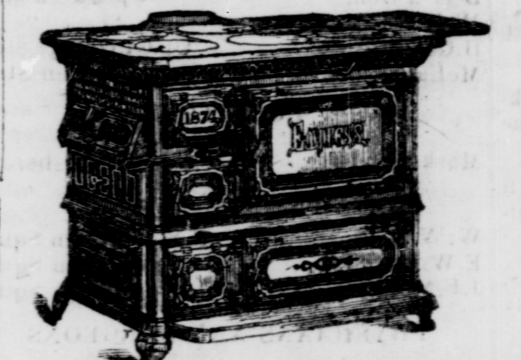
