Clay Is Named Fighter Of Month

NEW YORK (AP) — Cassius Clay has been named "fighter of the month" by Ring magazine for his performance in stopping Floyd Patterson in the second defence of his world heavyweight title.

Fighting Harada of Japan, who retained the world bantam crown on a unanimous decision over England's Alan Rudkin, and Carlos Ortiz, who recaptured the world lightweight crown from Ismael Laguna, were runners-up.

Ernie Terrell of Chicago, recognized by the World Boxing Association as the heavyweight king, was advanced to the No. 1 challenger's post in the new ratings with Patterson dropping to No. 2. Karl Mildenberger of Germany advanced from sixth to fourth right behind George Chuvalo of Toronto, Terrell's most recent victim.

Chuvalo was the only Canadian listed in the rankings.

Johnson Makes New Peace Bid

WASHINGTON (Reuters) — President Johnson made another Viet Nam peace bid Thursday. Speaking by telephone from the LBJ Ranch in Texas to a group of top businessmen here, the president asserted that "there can be peace, especially in Viet Nam, whenever men in other capitals are ready."

He restated his offer of unconditional talks to end the Viet Nam conflict, and at the same time appealed to U.S. business and labor to support American troops in Viet Nam by holding the wage-price line against inflation.

QUEENS FEDERATION HOLDS ANNUAL MEET

The annual meeting of the Queens County Federation of Agriculture was held last night at Birch Court in Charlottetown. County president Knud Jorgensen presided at the meeting which this province should be growing \$1,000,000 worth of feed grains instead of importing so much feed.

Teachers Back Salary Proposal

O'LEARY — At a meeting of O'Leary local of the Prince Edward Island Teachers' Federation held Wednesday evening, a number of recommendations were made to be presented to the board of governors of the federation.

President Alden Weeks presided over the meeting which was in unanimous agreement that their representatives to the board of governors meeting on Dec. 3 and 4 press for teachers' salaries as proposed to the local government one year ago and again this fall.

It was also recommended that annual revision of teachers' grants be made at the beginning of the school year. A further recommendation asks that the government make a decision regarding the proposed grants by Dec. 15.

During discussion, the following points were brought out: there has been no revision of teachers' salaries in this province since 1960; during this period the cost of living has increased by approximately 15 per cent on Prince Edward Island; in general, teachers' salaries on Prince Edward Island are the lowest in Canada; in order to retain teachers here salaries must be at least on a par with other Atlantic Provinces.

Consentation was expressed by all present that some 20 per cent of teachers in attendance were not receiving the 25 per cent supplement from their local school boards as recommended by Dr. Lezerte in 1960.

Limit Trucks On Early Trip

There were indications yesterday that Canadian National was cutting down on the number of trucks transported to this province during the past few days on the S.S. Prince Edward Island which makes the early run from Cape Tormentine.

It was reported that a number of trucks were left at Cape Tormentine although the ferry was not filled for the early morning crossing to Borden. It was suggested that either marine transport regulations or insurance rules prohibit the ferry carrying three rows of trucks on its vehicle deck as in three rows the trucks are packed too close together to allow fire fighters adequate movement in case of fire.

A Moncton official of Canadian National said last night he was not fully informed of the situation in which the limited number of trucks was being carried and said the matter will be checked and a statement likely will be issued today.

A Charlottetown trucker said last night the early crossing from Cape Tormentine is the one trucks coming to the island "rush to catch" and there usually is a big line-up of trucks waiting for the crossing.

Probe For Treasure Is Delayed

OAK ISLAND, N.S. (CP)—Excavations in search of a legendary treasure trove on this tiny, bottle-shaped island came to a halt Thursday when a 70-ton Digging Clam was taken to the mainland.

The digging clam—a 70-foot-high crane that had been in operation on the south side of the island for more than one month—left on contract to another job.

A new digging machine of the same nature is not expected to be brought here until Monday, Robert Dunfield, Sr., said. It would take at least a day to transport the digger across a 1,000-foot causeway to the island and put it into operation.
