

# Rotary Youth Assembly Meets Here Next Week

A motorcade of 25 cars driven by Charlottetown Rotarians is expected to transport 75 International Youth Assembly guests from Wood Islands ferry terminal to Charlottetown following the arrival of the "Lord Selkirk" on Saturday afternoon Aug. 16th, to remain here over the week-end. President Russ Selkirk and general chairman George C. Fisher will meet the guests at Caribou.

This "Rotary Adventure in International Service," designed to further world understanding, brings the group of 75 young folk together in Rotary District 782 on Aug. 9th to 21st. Representatives of the states in the American union and over thirty countries of the world, the group will constitute the most cosmopolitan assembly ever brought together in the Atlantic Provinces.

The opening session of the Assembly at Saint John, N.B., will be marked by a dinner and reception with past president of Rotary International, Dr. Percy Hodgson, L.L.D., D. Hum, as guest speaker.

"Seminar of Canada" will be the key-note of daily discussions at various points as the guests move from place to place where Rotary Clubs are located in the Atlantic Provinces.

Outstanding guest speakers on Canadian history, especially that of the early days in the Atlantic Provinces, will include the Premier of the four provinces and Senator C.F. Savoie, who will speak at Moncton on French Canada.

Other guest speakers will be the American Ambassador to Canada, the High Commissioner for the United Kingdom to Canada and

the Prime Minister of Canada.

Following a dinner meeting on Thursday Aug. 21st, in Saint John, where the Dominion of Canada will be host, and the Prime Minister in attendance, a meeting will be held in the Capitol Theatre at which Prime Minister Diefenbaker will be guest speaker. The meeting will be televised across the Continent.

**IN CHARLOTTETOWN**

The motorcade is expected to arrive in Charlottetown at approximately 5.30 p.m. and assemble at the Armouries where the hosts will meet their guests for conveyance to their homes.

At 9 o'clock the Assembly will be guests of the Charlottetown Driving Park Association at the Exhibition Grounds to witness the final night of harness races during Old Home Week.

Sunday will be unscheduled in order that the visitors may attend their respective churches and participate in such relaxing activities as may be provided by their hosts.

Hon. Thane A. Campbell, Chief Justice of the Province will preside at the seminar which opens at 9.30 a.m. on Monday in the Legislative Assembly. Here the speakers will be Dr. Frank MacKinnon and Judge W.E. Darby, the subject being "Prince Edward Island and birthplace of Canada."

At 11.00 a.m. the guests will visit the Confederation Chamber and hear an outline of its history from Commissioner Robert Craig.

At noon a combined Civic and Rotary luncheon at the Charlottetown Hotel will be presided over by His Worship Mayor Edwin C. Johnstone who is a Past District Governor of Rotary. The co-chair-

man will be City Councillor Rotarian Earl Baker. Members of the City Council will be head table guests. Right Rev. James S. Thompson, M.A., L.L.D., F.R.S.C., of Montreal will be guest speaker.

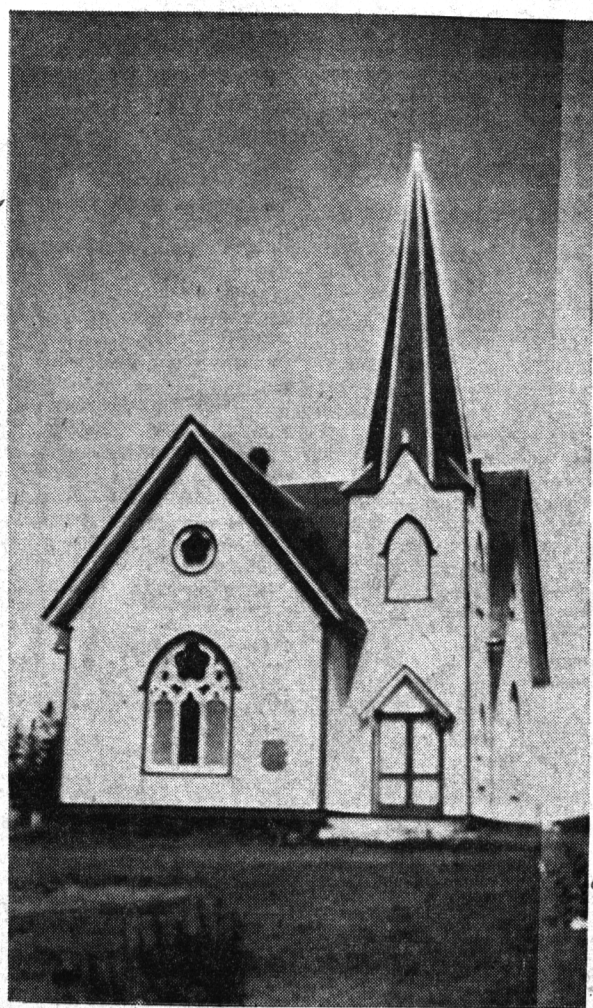
The seminar session will resume in the Legislature at 2.30 p.m. and at 4.00 p.m. they will meet His Honour Lieut. Governor F.W. Hyndman and Mrs. Hyndman at Government House.

Hon. A.W. Matheson, Premier, will be guest speaker at a dinner in the Charlottetown Hotel at 7.30 p.m., sponsored by the Government of P. E. Island. Dr. G.C. Fisher will preside.

Following the dinner meeting a dance for the young folk will be held at the hotel with music by Don Messer and his Islanders.

The Youth Assembly members will be conveyed to Borden early Tuesday morning by the Rotary motorcade and met by Amherst Rotarians on arrival at Tormentine to continue their trip to Moncton, their next seminar stop. Among the countries represented are England, New Zealand, India, Pakistan, Ceylon, Malaya, Hong Kong, Bermuda, Guatemala, Costa Rica, Portugal, Finland, Austria, Belgium, Bolivia, Ecuador, Columbia, Scotland, Eira, Ireland, Afghanistan, Egypt, Ethiopia, Haiti, Iraq, Japan, Poland.

## Will Serve 7 Days On Drunken Driving Charge

A 19-year-old Charlottetown youth appeared in City Police Court yesterday on a drunken driving charge. The accused, a resident of DesBrisay Crescent, pleaded guilty to the charge and was sentenced to serve seven days in the Queens County Jail.

A charge of driving while impaired against a resident of Toronto was withdrawn but the accused was fined \$20 and costs or 10 days when he was convicted of being drunk and incapable.

Remanded from August 2nd, on a charge of indecent exposure, a resident of York Road was further remanded to Monday, August 11.

A 46-year-old Charlottetown man was sentenced to 40 days in jail when he pleaded guilty to a charge of vagrancy.

Appearing on a charge of being drunk and incapable, a 41-year-old resident of Pownall Street was sentenced to 15 days.

A Fort Augustus youth who appeared on a charge of driving a motor vehicle with defective brakes was remanded to August 6.

For failing to stop at a red traffic light a resident of Elm Avenue was fined \$15 and costs or five days.

In Queens County Magistrate's Court yesterday, evidence was completed in the case against a resident of Pleasant Grove who is charged with having the illegal possession of a still for the manufacture of intoxicating spirits. Magistrate Gilbert A. Gaudet adjourned the case to Monday August 11, for consideration of the evidence.
