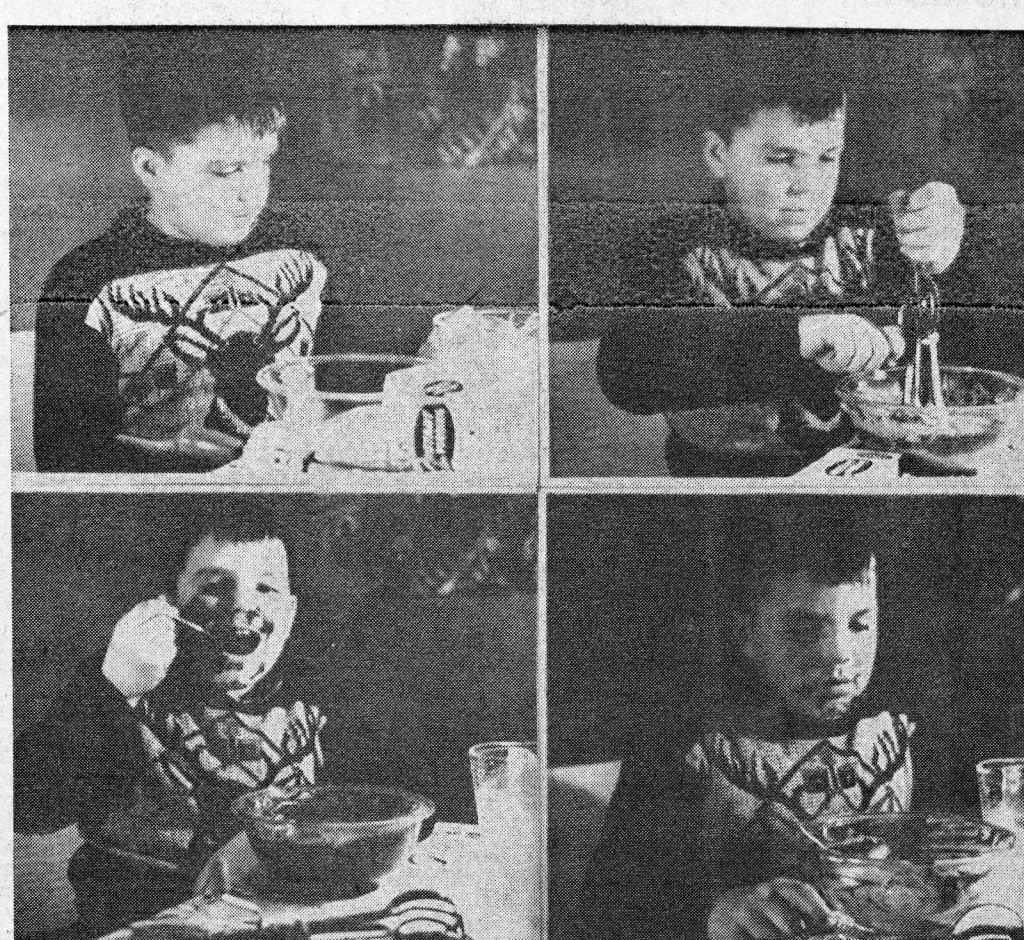

Major Loss In Red Cross Break Is Individuals'

Interviewed last evening Miss Iphigene Arsenault, Provincial Red Cross Commissioner, stated that just \$80.00 of the funds missing as the result of the robbery at Red Cross over the past week-end were returns from the current Red Cross Campaign. This amount had been received after the last banking was deposited on Friday afternoon. "Campaign funds are deposited daily at this time of the year", Miss Arsenault said.

The \$3,500 reported as missing early this week was composed mostly of personal bonds belonging to staff members who have replaced by Security Houses. It was further stated that receipt books and correspondence have been checked through since Monday, and that those who have recently sent in money orders and cheques are being written and asked to take their receipts to local Post Offices and have duplicate orders issued. This should help considerably in making the loss a good bit less, than was at first surmised.
