Committee To Seek Support For Peace Research Institute

A planning committee with power to add members was established at a Canadian Peace Research Institute meeting held Tuesday night in Prince of Wales College.

The meeting was held to acquaint citizens with the aims and purposes of the Canadian Peace Research Institute.

A spokesman for the meeting said that "very lively discussion" was held despite the relatively small number of those in attendance.

It was hoped to have a well-known Canadian speaker as highlight for the next meeting to be held in late May or early June.

The Canadian Peace Research Institute is a non-profit institute incorporated under federal charter.

Jap Plywood Causes Worry

OTTAWA (CP) — The Canadian Lumbermen's Association said Thursday Japan should be asked to reconsider its voluntary quota of 51,000,000 square feet of hardwood plywood exports to Canada in 1962.

The quota, set in consultations between Japan and Canada, was announced here April 25. It was 49,500,000 square feet last year.

G. E. Bell, general manager of the association, said the plywood industry in Canada has been asking for the last five years for reductions in Japanese imports because of harmful effects on Canadian firms.

"If the condition was had enough for this industry to make representations . . . since 1957 when imports of Japanese hardwood plywoods were 38,000,000 feet and Canadian companies were being forced to close their doors, obviously they are even worse now," Mr. Bell said.

He said imports of Japanese hardwood plywood totalled 46,700,000 square feet in the first 11 months of 1961 and estimated the year's total at more than 51,000,000 square feet.

Nfld's Loggers Are To Work Under Single Contract In 1962

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP) — Newfoundland's 15,000 loggers will work under a single contract signed by the province's two paper companies, it was announced Tuesday.

H. U. Allen, a representative of the United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners of America (CLC), announced Tuesday that the contract had come into effect.

The two-year contract was signed Saturday by the Anglo-Newfoundland Development Company Limited at Grand Falls and Monday by Bowater's Newfoundland Pulp and Paper Mills Limited at Corner Brook and the Newfoundland Contractors Association, representing private woodlot owners.

The contract provides that new employees are to become members of the union after seven days with a maintenance membership clause and provisions for checkoff, Mr. Allen said.

CONTRACT DISPUTED

The contract negotiations were held despite opposition from the International Woodworkers of America (IWA), which claims majority support of the loggers, and the CLC, which had suggested the two unions withdraw from Newfoundland for a year in favor of a CLC-sponsored union, which would represent the loggers.

After the year, an independent vote would be conducted among the loggers to determine whether they want the carpenters or the IWA to represent them as bargaining agents.

In its place, the Newfoundland Brotherhood of Wood Workers (Ind.) was formed, but voted itself out of existence last year, recommending that the carpenters be invited into take its place.

The carpenters conducted a vote among the loggers and claimed they had received majority support, but this was ridiculed by the IWA, which claimed the loggers really wanted the IWA back.

Highway Traffic Violation Charge Dismissed By Court

J. Watson MacNaught, QC, represented the accused while the Crown was represented by Crown Prosecutor Allan Scales.

A remand until May 9 was given Gordon Stanley MacInnis, Charlottetown, on a charge of driving while impaired. Crown evidence in the case was completed.

The case of Sterling Hackett, Mount Albion, charged under the Potato Marketing Board Act, was further adjourned for argument by counsel until May 16 by consent.

Hackett is charged with trucking 75, 75-pound bags of potatoes and 205 15-pound bags of potatoes to the mainland without first obtaining an invoice and without paying the one cent per hundredweight levy as required under the Act.

Counsel for the defence is Al-

ston M. O'Leary, while the prosecution is being conducted by John J. Holmes.

Pleading guilty to having possession of intoxicating liquor in a place other than his residence an accused was fined \$20 and costs or 30 days in jail.
