TRANSPORTS HAVE LEFT TAMPA.
Have Sailed for Santiago
WITH 12,000 U. S. REGULARS ON BOARD.

Admiral Sampson to Convey the Expedition.
[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]
WASHINGTON, May 31.—Troops are moving at last. Several transports left Tampa last night and their destination is said to be Santiago de Cuba.
At a war conference, yesterday, all the details of the combined military naval expedition against Santiago were arranged. The exact number of troops to be sent is 22,000 who will be all regulars, the best equipped and best trained men in the service. They are picked out because the service for which they are wanted is actual war.

The enemy which they will confront numbers 10,000 men, not all soldiers, for the Spanish impressed into their service all young and old men in the city of Santiago.
The positive location of the Spanish fleet has spurred the army to action.
Admiral Sampson has his convoys ready.
All ships have been withdrawn from in front of Havana, save those which are absolutely necessary to preserve the blockade. The combined expedition will be under the command of Major-General Shafter and Commodore Schley.
General Miles wanted to command the military forces, but it was decided that his presence was necessary in the United States until the volunteer army is fully organized and equipped.
Admiral Sampson is ranking naval officer, but he had his opportunity to win glory at San Juan and failed so it is Schley's turn.
Besides Admiral Sampson is to have charge of the bombardment of Havana when that event occurs.
The troops will reach Key West this afternoon.

It is said to be 700 miles from there to Santiago and the distance cannot be travelled by transports in less than 72 hours, so it will be Saturday afternoon before they will be opposite Santiago.
In the meantime Schley will keep the Spanish fleet bottled up. The troops will be landed on some near-by point to Santiago on the coast, and will attack the batteries carrying them by storm and thus clear a way for Schley, who will then sail in to meet the fleet.
The location of the Spanish fleet is accurately known.
Two armoured cruisers and two torpedo boats lie hidden behind Smith island about half a mile within the Harbor and around shelving promontories.
The other two cruisers are in the basin directly in front of the city.

PORTO RICO WILL BE NEXT
To be Attacked By U. S.
30,000 MEN TO BE SENT WHEN READY.

Meanwhile Havana Will Not Be Touched.

WASHINGTON, May 31.—An expedition against Porto Rico will follow the attack upon Santiago.
The combined movement would require about 30,000 men, and the Government has not this number of regulars at southern ports.
The movement against Havana will not be undertaken until 75,000 men are ready and this will take some six weeks or two months to accomplish.

News Notes.
The war has made Joseph Leiter millions of dollars, says the Chicago Tribune. In one month wheat has advanced 45c a bushel in Liverpool, and pulled young Leiter out of the jaws of disaster. Men in the trade are talking of nothing but Leiter's luck. On top of the wonderful advance abroad comes the news that the French duty on wheat has been temporarily removed. This duty has been 36 8-10 cents a bushel since 1894. The last time it was removed was during the Russian famine in 1891. The response to the action of the French Government by the American market was an advance up to Friday of 30 cents a bushel in cash wheat, and from 8 to 10 cents a bushel in the futures. On Thursday night May wheat closed at \$1.50.
The London Times suggests that the United States Government might land an expeditionary force in the vicinity of Santiago de Cuba, which could thus be invested both by sea and by land, and could not hold out long. Such an enterprise, the Times thinks, if successful, might put not only the Spanish ships but the cable station into American hands.

SUPPLEMENTARY ESTIMATES
Have Been Brought Down
NEW WINTER STEAMER FOR P. E. ISLAND.

Mulock's Civil Service Superannuation Bill.
[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]
OTTAWA, May 31.—The supplementary estimates were laid on the table of the House last night.
The amount chargeable to capital is \$1,130,430; chargeable to income \$1,961,933; amount chargeable to railway subsidies \$65,963; total \$3,058,326.
Among the items are steam communication between Prince Edward Island and Great Britain five thousand; and a new steamer to take the place of the Stanley on the P. E. Island winter service one hundred and eighty thousand.
Mulock moved a second reading of the Civil Service Superannuation Bill.
As amended the bill provided that all who have not been ten years in the service or who may hereafter be appointed shall no longer be a subject to the provisions of the present superannuation system.
These employees are hereafter to have a deduction of five per cent. made from their salaries.
This money is to be placed to their credit, and interest at five per cent. will be allowed on it. The gross amount of such deductions, with interest, to be paid to the officer when he is retired or to his heirs if he dies in office.
Those who have been more than ten years in service may elect whether they shall retain the old law or go under the provisions of Mulock's law.
It is also provided that an officer who has been less than ten years in the service may then, if he chooses to retire, claim a gratuity of one month's pay for each year of service.
