"From the point of view of industry, a problem drinker is an individual to whom repeated or continued overindulgence interferes with the efficient performance of his work assignment."

I am quoting from Quarterly Journal Studies Alcohol, New Haven, Conn., an article by Drs. R. C. Page, J. J. Thorpe, and W. W. Caldwell about 36 patients who were advised to undergo treatment or decided to do it themselves.

Ten patients sought help under Alcoholics Anonymous. Eight of these were successfully rehabilitated.

Psychiatric treatment alone was given to five patients. One fair result was obtained and four were failures.

A combination of psychiatric treatment, group treatment in Alcoholics Anonymous and medical treatment was used in eight cases.

These physicians are convinced that there are far more problem drinkers in industry than are carried on the confidential records of industrial medical departments.

In Alcoholics Anonymous, the foundation stone toward rebuilding the personality is being willing to admit that they need help.

As with any disease, there are apt to be relapses and this is true in a small percentage of cases.

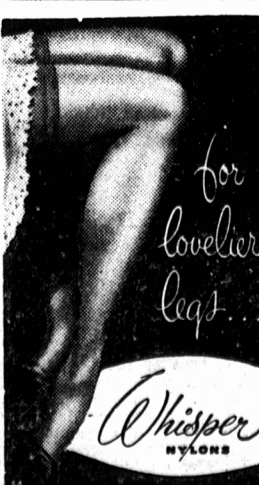
Coronation Pageant

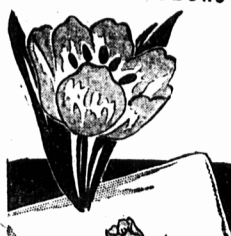

PUFF PASTRY

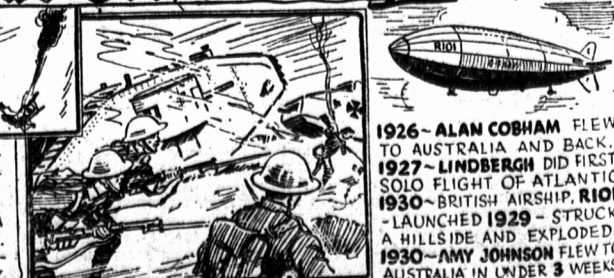

George V (CONTINUED)

IN 1914, GREAT BRITAIN DECLARED WAR ON GERMANY IN DEFENCE OF BELGIUM. THE FIRST WORLD WAR LASTED 4 YEARS. AEROPLANES AND TANKS WERE USED IN BATTLE FOR THE FIRST TIME.
