

**Credit Financing  
Urged For Farm**

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP)—A radical new system of credit financing for farmers was advocated in a brief by the Nova Scotia department of agriculture presented to the conference of ministers and deputy ministers of agriculture here Monday.

The brief suggested that the farmers "abandon the prevailing idea a loan must be repaid in any specified length of time and adopt the same financial structures as most corporations." Farms might even get to the level, it said, where practically all capital is borrowed "with no thought of repaying the principal in a generation."

Other speakers spoke of concerns in their provinces about the general farm credit situation. The conference agreed that "since both federal and provincial government agencies were in the field of credit, discussions should be held with Ottawa to develop a co-ordinated farm credit administrative policy, giving recognition to credit extension facilities already available in many provinces."

Second to farm credit on the conference's long agenda was agricultural research. It was urged by the Ontario department of agriculture that the success of any industry is dependent in direct proportion to the efficiency of their research organization.

"It is felt," the brief said, "that the organization of agricultural research in Canada is one field which requires a great deal of immediate attention. Under the present organization for agricultural research, both federal and provincial government agencies are involved with essentially the same forms of reference."

The brief suggested careful study for a long term program.
