Sanderson's Hereford May Be Canada's Best

HALIFAX — The Hereford steer that won the grand championship at the Atlantic Winter Fair for Fulton Sanderson York Point may well be the outstanding animal of the year in Canada.

The statement is made on the authority of a man who is in a position to know. It was Finley Stewart district inspector livestock division Canada Department of Agriculture Moncton.

At Moncton he suggested this to me as we talked in the cattle ring — it's the Halifax Forum's ice-surface when it's flooded — the morning after the detailed scoring was posted in the refrigerated show window at one end of the building.

Mr. Stewart added that he does not know — he won't until the results of all of the Canadian steer shows are available but

the fact that this knowledgeable that may be true brings further honors to the North River man who has dominated the Atlantic Province's biggest agricultural fair now for two years in a row, so far as production of top steers are concerned. S.C. Oland, Lower Sackville, N.S., won the steer trophy at the first AWF.

It wasn't merely that the 1,066-pound Hereford topped the show when the carcass judging was added to that on the hoof. It was the impressive margin of victory he chalked up.

The grand champion steer earned that honor most impressively. This animal earned 85½ points out of a possible 100. And that's an almost unbelievable 12 points better than the CFRA radio station's Kilreen Farm steer from Ottawa that finished second.

From there on the competition was close. Irving MacDon-

ald of York missed the reserve grand-championship by only one-half a percentage point as his steers total was 73 points.

George P. Kelly Morell had the steer that placed fourth in the overall results and his animal also earned 73 points. They have the York steer ahead because he had a head higher alive I imagine — the MacDonald steer topped the judging alive.

JUDGING SUGGESTION
This reminds me that Glen Cotton the Island's popular beef fieldman believes the live judging should be abolished altogether in this business of steer judging. The detail of Glen's reasoning will come in a future farm column.

The Windfield Farms Toronto steer earned a total of 71½ points for his fifth-place finish and Robert Sanderson Fulton's son saw his steer earn a total of 70 points for the sixth placing.

Robert must have been the most surprised of all of the people who finished in the first six places. He had been a way down in 15th place on the hoof.

A comparison of some of the detailed scoring on the three top steers is as follows:

The Sanderson steer was awarded 25½ points alive, out of a possible 28; 17 points for carcass appraisal — appearance and conformation — out of a possible 18; nine points out of 18 for weight per day of age. In the area of loin eye he earned an impressive 16 out of a possible 18 points and for the distribution of fat he earned a perfect 18 points. The animal's dressing percentage was 69.3 percent.

The Kilreen Farm steer that placed second earned 26½ points alive — that's out of the possible 28; he had 16 for carcass appraisal but he got no points at all for weight per day of age. And that was his downfall. This animal at 483 days weighed 494 pounds, warm dressed weight. He had 13 points for the eye of loin and he also had an impressively perfect 18 points for distribution of fat.

PERFECT CARCASS
Here's the carcass scoring and total score for the Irving MacDonald steer that topped the show on the hoof. He received an almost perfect 27 points alive had a perfect 18 points for carcass appraisal. He had only four points for weight per day of age, and this is where he dropped from the top rating he had alive. This steer was 514 days old and weighed 696, warm dressed weight.

The MacDonald steer had a creditable 18 points for distribution of fat and the total of 73 points. It was his scoring in the weight per day of age — he was 12 points below the championship steer in this item alone — that really made the difference.

The Canadian Hereford Breeders Association should think up an award of their own to Fulton Sanderson who has bred and fitted animals for two years in a row that have topped this important agricultural show on the strength of the carcass judging normally — almost invariably — it has been the Angus steers that have had the best carcass scoring at the major

Stanfield Wants Ottawa Petition

BRIDGEWATER, N.S. (CP) — Premier Robert Stanfield told a Conservative rally here Friday night that he would request that the premiers of the four Atlantic provinces to join together in making representations to Ottawa concerning the "increasing tightness of credit in these provinces."

Speaking to his 11th rally in the last 12 days, Mr. Stanfield said "credit is getting exceedingly restricted, and is bound to slow down our rate of development drastically, unless measures of relief are provided."

The Municipal Development Fund which set up \$16,000,000 five years ago is "virtually exhausted" as far as this province is concerned.

"If credit restrictions are permitted to bring development to a halt in this province, we will have to go through all the difficulties of trying to get things moving forward again when credit becomes easier."

Mr. Stanfield said he felt it would be better if the Atlantic premiers petition Ottawa now about this matter rather than delay the request until the Atlantic Premiers' Conference in Charlottetown Nov. 22.

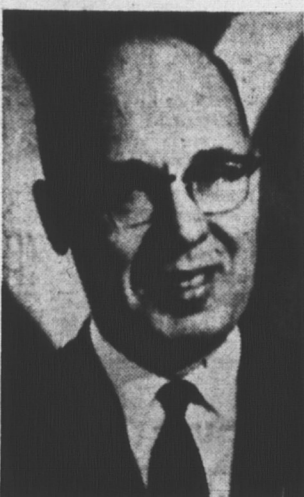
PLAN MEMBERSHIP BLITZ

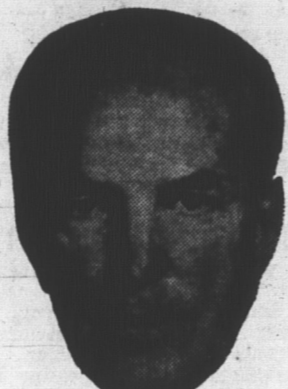
Fines Imposed By Magistrate

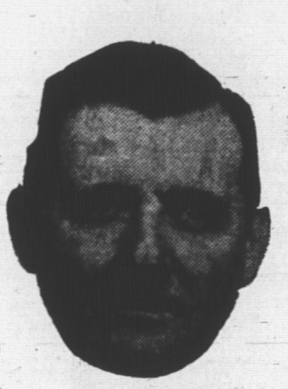

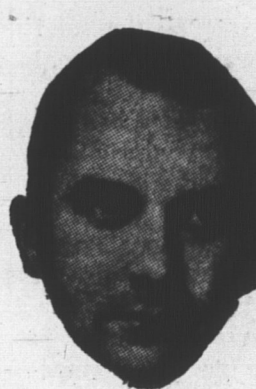
