SUCCESSFUL ISLANDER.—William N. LePage, son of Mr. Alfred LePage, St. Peter's Road, and formerly clerk in the London House, left this city in the fall of 1876, and in the following year organized a company in Boston for the manufacture of cement and isinglass. Subsequently, in 1876, he bought the total stock and trade of the company, and sold it to a joint stock company in Rockport, Mass. *Rev. R. S. Crisp preached on Tuesday evening, and Rev. H. R. Barker, A. B., yesterday (Wednesday) morning at 7 o'clock. The old men do not seem to be afraid of the younger men departing from the standards of belief, for Rev. H. Daniel was the only aged Minister present at the morning service.

OPENING OF CONFERENCE.

Scripture was read by Rev. H. P. Cowperthwaite, and the hymn "Are we yet alive," sung. Then Drs. Stewart and Pickard led in prayer. Between sixty and seventy answered to their names when the roll was called. First voting for President gave Dr. Stewart 7; Rev. S. T. Teed, 8; Rev. D. Chapman, 17; and Rev. E. Evans, 29. Next vote Mr. Evans was elected. He had 37 and Mr. Chapman 22 votes. The President elect promised to do his best in the chair. Being of true Methodist parentage, he claimed to be a real Methodist preacher. He rejoiced in the doctrines of Methodism and trusted that he would enjoy all that he preached from the pulpit. The ex-President thanked the brethren for their forbearance with his many infirmities during his year of office; but was most thankful to the great Head of the Church. Three votes were taken before a Secretary was elected. The names of Messrs. Cowperthwaite, Chapman and Weddall were the favorites. The last gave Mr. Chapman 32 and Mr. Cowperthwaite 35 votes. Mr. Cowperthwaite was therefore elected. He said he knew that his election meant hard work and responsibility. He promised to do his best. Thanks were voted to the retiring officers, including President, Secretary, Journal Secretary and assistants, Messrs. Thos. Marshall, Wm. Harrison and Geo. W. Fisher were appointed assistant Secretaries. Messrs. J. Hewie and F. Allen were appointed a committee to disburse the conference collection. Both morning and afternoon session was occupied with examination of ministerial character. Mr. Freeman, a probationer, was reported to have left during the year; and Mr. Hagarty, another probationer, was allowed to retire one year on account of ill health. Conference prayer meeting at noon was well attended by the inhabitants of St. John. Revs. Messrs. Smallwood, Daniel, Duncan, Chapman, Jost, Burwash, Comben and Percival led in prayer. It was a hallowed season. Yesterday evening a most enthusiastic and largely attended Missionary meeting was held, with the President in the Chair. Speeches by Messrs. Fisher, Levi S. Johnson, Deinstadt, Read, Daniel and J. B. Coates (Sussex), of a high order. Singing by a well-trained choir was inspiring.
