Singers Rewarded ... With Reservations

(The following was written especially for the Guardian by the director of music for P.E.I.) By CHRISTOPHER GLEDHILL Earl Terry as adjudicator, as guide, philosopher and friend to young musicians of all ages is no stranger to the Island. Last night we were able to hear his chorus "live" for the first time, and it was a very rewarding experience.

These 30 young ladies under Mr. Terry's leadership are all obviously professional in fact if not in name. They have built up a formidable repertoire. One astonishing feature is the fact that they sing right through the whole program, without spitting up into smaller groups and without solos, completely from memory. Not once did I detect the slightest lapse of memory from a single chorister. The intonation is well-nigh perfect. The diction is generally clear except, though his vowel "oo" needs some attention, and the sonorous vowels of the Latin language were not open enough for my taste. Mr. Terry is fortunate in having a first-class young accompanist.

Reverting to the chorus, the ensemble except for the slightly hesitant openings was a model of perfection. Phrasing was really beautiful. Their piano tone was really ravishing except for one or two patches where it sounded a little perfunctory by comparison. SOMETIMES HARSH
