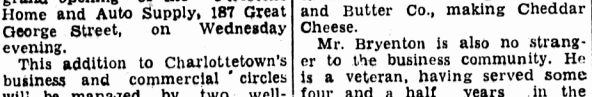

Open New Business Wednesday

An agricultural mission, composed of four government officials from India, who are touring Canada to study the Experimental Farms and stations arrived in the City yesterday. They are Dr. S. R. Barooah, Director of Agriculture for the Government of Assam, Dr. K. G. Joshi, Deputy Director of Agriculture for Madhya Pradesh, Mr. S. A. Hamid, Principal, Central Co-operative Trading Institute at Pusa, and Mr. G. M. Buti, Director of Agriculture for Jammu and the Kashmir Government.

Their stay here will last until Thursday and this morning they will interview the Minister of Agriculture, the Hon. C. C. Baker, and his staff, and call on His Honour, Lt.-Gov. T. W. L. Prowse and Premier J. Walter Jones. In the afternoon the party will tour the Experimental Station and the Science Service laboratories.

A round table discussion will be held on Wednesday morning, on the co-operative projects in the Province, and visits will be made in the afternoon to various co-operative enterprises and farms. At 8 p.m. each of the visiting party will address a meeting of the Agricultural Institute of Canada, in the Vocational Wing of Prince of Wales College.

Accompanying Mr. Wills is Mr. Whitney Dalrymple, General Secretary of the M.R.E.C. Mr. Dalrymple has had a wide experience with boys' work in the Maritime Provinces. On Monday, Oct. 22, Mr. Wills will address youth leaders at a supper meeting in the Social Hall of Trinity United Church.

As Secretary of the Department of Christian Education, Mr. Wills gives leadership in all phases of co-operative work in the field of youth work. His department is concerned with leadership training for teachers in Church schools, as well as leaders of mid-week groups in the churches.

Before assuming his present position, Mr. Wills came from the pastorate of Central Christian Church, Vancouver, B.C. where he served for seven years.

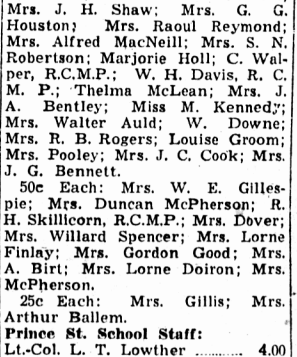

Liberal Meeting At Eldon Hall

Instead of building roads to present specifications the standard should be relaxed somewhat until the secondary roads of the Province are improved, Hon. Dougald MacKinnon, Minister of Public Works and Highways, suggested at the annual meeting of the Fourth Queen's Liberal Association at Eldon Hall on Saturday night.

Emphasizing the need for a change in the present Government road building policy, Mr. MacKinnon pointed out that the present standard calls for a 66 foot right of way, which costs so much that only ten miles a year can be built in any one district.

Addresses were also given at the meeting by Hon. A. W. Matheson, Minister of Health and Welfare and acting Premier in the absence of Premier Jones; Mr. Arthur Peake, secretary of the Queen's County Liberal Association, and Mr. Milton Furness, the Association secretary.

Mr. Harold Smith of Pownal was elected president for the ensuing year. He replaces Mr. Stewart Ross of Flat River who retired at his own request. Mr. Ross was elected vice-president and Mr. Milton Furness of Vernon River was re-elected secretary-treasurer.

Messrs. Joseph Cook of Bello River and William Murphy of Vernon Bridge were named to the Central Executive.

A request that trucks leaving Charlottetown now with mail in the morning be held until the afternoon was expressed in a resolution voicing dissatisfaction with the present service. Other resolutions expressed pleasure about the health of His Majesty the King was improving and that the Princess Elizabeth and Prince Philip were able to visit this country and will be coming to this Province; reaffirmed confidence in the Liberal administration at Ottawa; endorsed the administration of Premier Jones, a representative of the district, and noted with pride and satisfaction that Mr. MacKinnon had been appointed to a senior portfolio in the cabinet.

Growth Of Communism In China Described By Dr. Chan At Rotary

China became Communist because the vast majority of the people had a minimum of material goods together with spiritual poverty. The easy slogans of Marxism backed by the powerful leadership of Russian trained key personnel and militant local committees, offered hope of something to the millions without hope, said Dr. G. A. Chan, member of the staff of the Provincial Sanatorium. He was addressing Rotarians at their weekly luncheon yesterday.

In the forty years since the fall of the Ching dynasty, the Republic of China failed to bridge the gap between the old feudalistic system and the democratic form of government. There are a number of reasons for this failure, said Dr. Chan, but the principal ones have to do with the vastness of the country and its population of millions. Divided into distinct provinces each of which mistrusted the others, and Dr. W. H. Soper was suggested as chairman of first aid, and Mr. W. K. Sharpe as chairman of swimming and water safety. The council unanimously agreed that Mrs. Bagnall and Mrs. H. L. Palmer both be commended for the award of honorary membership in recognition of their splendid services rendered over the past ten years in furthering the activities of the Red Cross in this province in connection with the corps as well as with other phases of the provincial programme.

The budget for the year 1952 was discussed and approved. Progress reports covering the past three months were given by the chairman of the various committees. Mrs. E. A. Foster's report revealed that the work accomplished by the many women's groups throughout the province notably the Women's Institutes has been packed in 15 cases, and shipped to Turkey on instructions received from national headquarters as to the great need of this shipment consisted of 3,075 knitted and sewn garments for girls and boys and also included infants' layettes. The quota for the coming season, 1951-52, is twice that of last year and will mean that more groups and more workers will be required.
