ERRATA.—The robbery of the mails, referred to yesterday, was committed while the bag was being conveyed from Wiltshire Station to Darlington, and not while being removed from Winslow Station to Darlington, as inadvertently stated. At latest accounts the boy suspected had not been captured.

A FISH STORY.—The Liverpool, N. S., Advance is responsible for the following: "A very interesting fight was witnessed by a number of persons quite recently. It was that of an eel and a large gray snake, which was swimming on the surface of the water. The battle raged for some minutes when, to the astonishment of all present, the eel swallowed the snake and in a few moments the eel was floating on the water dead."

A HEARTLESS FARMER.—The New Glasgow Chronicle says: "Early this week a horse belonging to a man a few miles in the country, was taken sick while in town. In the evening, when starting for home, it was found that the animal was not able to draw the wagon; its owner then struck the animal on the head with an axe and left it for dead. Next morning the poor creature was found to be still alive and suffering terribly, and from the appearance of the surroundings, had been struggling the whole night."

PROF. EDMONDS, the world-famous Australian Wizard, aided by a coterie of talented artists, commences a limited engagement at the Lyceum Theatre on Monday evening next, June 9. The Ottawa Free Press says: Prof. Edmonds played to full houses again last evening. He is undoubtedly the greatest living magician. Ricardo's Marionettes caused great amusement. Madam Delano's Dissolving Views created a great sensation. A leading feature of the entertainment is the lavish distribution of presents, including gold and silver watches, silver ice pitchers, gage baskets, etc.

TWO SOCIETY EVENTS.—Henry M. Stanley is to be married in Westminster Abbey, on July 12, and the occasion is likely to be made a great society event.
Wm. O'Brien will be married at Brampton on June 11, when John Dillon will act as best man, and all the Irish members will attend. Miss Raffolovich will be confirmed in her new faith this week by Cardinal Manning. Mr. and Mrs. O'Brien will spend their honeymoon at Mr. Corbett's house, Glen of Down, County Wicklow, one of the most charming spots in Ireland.

MINERALS IN NOVA SCOTIA.—J. H. Smith, of Kingston, King's Co., N. S., prospector, and F. A. Palmer, have discovered a large bed and leads of manganese and hematite iron on which mining rights are made secure. In tracing the leads of iron, they came across rocks and fossils belonging to the triassic and upper carboniferous system. Mr. Smith, being an amateur mineralogist and geologist, at once felt sure that coal must be in the immediate neighborhood, and a little careful research revealed sandstone and shale, also a small quantity of coal. The iron being close by the coal, without doubt, in the near future, the iron will be manufactured on the spot.

MORTUARY STATISTICS.—We are indebted to Dr. Johnson for the following mortuary statistics of the city of Charlottetown, for the quarter ending May 31st, 1890: March, 16; April, 12; May, 10; total 38. As compared with last year, March, 21; April, 13; May, 14; total, 48. Causes of death in the order of fatality: Consumption, 6; old age and general debility, 5; hemorrhage, 2; heart disease, 2; croup, 2; scarlet fever, 2; pneumonia, 2; cancer, 2; abscess of liver, 1; inflammation of bowels, 1; peritonitis, 1; bronchitis, 1; uremia, 1; thrombosis, 1; tumor, 1; drowning, 1; accidental fall, 1; other, 6. Age at death—Under 5 years, 8; from 17 to 47, 14; from 55 to 70, 10; from 74 to 92, 6. Average age at death, 42-2-3 years. Religion—Protestants, 26; Catholics, 12. Nationality—English, 14; Scotch, 13; Irish, 9. Sex—Males, 10; females, 22.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.
Royalty at the Capital.
OTTAWA, June 4.
Prince Arthur met a royal welcome here to-day, and evidently enjoyed his hurried visit. In his reply to the civic address, he spoke of the incredible progress apparent in Canada since his visit twenty years ago. He visited the parliament library, and when re-entering his carriage, noticed and stopped to give a warm greeting to some thirty veterans who had fallen into line to do him honor. The premier entertained a small party at luncheon to meet the Duke and Lord Stanley.

The Newfoundland Trouble.
HALIFAX, June 4.
Newfoundland papers received by the steamer Miranda to-night are filled with violent articles regarding the French outrages at Bay St. George. The St. John's Herald declares that the abduction of a Canadian by a French fishing vessel and leaving him on the lonely Red Island was only the beginning of the outrages. It asserts that there was not a French fisherman within two hundred miles of Sandy Point Bay St. George, the spot where the British were compelled to take up their nets on the 23rd ult. He declares that this outrage upon Imperial and Colonial rights was aggravated in the highest degree by the circumstances of insolence and violence which attended its perpetration. An armed body of French Marines went in their boats to the place in the harbor of Sandy Point where the nets of Newfoundland fishermen were set, and then under the very guns of the British warship Pelican ordered them to be taken out of the water. The Herald goes on to declare that the people must fish, that they will defend themselves, and any interference must result in bloodshed. On the events of the next few days hangs the issue of life and death in the colony. If the blood of Newfoundland's sons is spilt, and England looks on at the sacrifice, the Herald fears that the long affecting of the two centuries may be quenched in the bosom of the people.

Ice Reported.
HALIFAX, June 4.
The steamer Miranda arrived from Newfoundland to-night, after being blockaded by ice in Twillingate Bay for three days. The Captain reports that the whole coast from Green Bay to Trinity Bay, a distance of 130 miles, is solidly packed with bergs and drift ice to a depth of fifteen miles out to sea. The Miranda brought up fifteen men of the wrecked St. John's bark Carrier Dove, which was nipped in the ice and sunk.

Against the High Tariff.
AUGUSTA, Me., June 4.
The Democratic State Convention to-day adopted the usual resolutions against a high protective tariff, and denunciatory of Republican rule. The minority report from the resolutions of the committee asking that the prohibitory constitutional amendment be submitted to the people, created considerable confusion, and was finally defeated. F. W. Hill, of Exeter, was nominated for Governor.

The Turf.
LONDON, June 4.
Sainfoin won the Derby, Lenord second, and Orwell third. The stakes were 5,000 sovereigns for winner, 300 for second, and 200 for third. There were eight starters.

The Duke of Orleans Pardoned.
PARIS, June 4.
President Carnot has granted a pardon to the Duke of Orleans, arrested February last for violating the decree of exile.
