Opportunities Ample For Seeing The Queen

Opportunities for Islanders and visitors to see Queen Elizabeth next week, seem unlimited. On at least 10 occasions, they may see her and Prince Philip in their automobile driving along Charlottetown's streets. She will also make an appearance on the balcony of the Provincial Building and will be seen by thousands of children at the children's rally at the Exhibition grounds.

At the outset the Royal couple may be seen when disembarking from the Royal yacht Britannia, which will be tied up at the department of transport wharf.

The first of the street drives will begin at 2:28 Tuesday afternoon when they leave the wharf en route to the new Memorial Buildings. The car will travel at a slow pace on Queen, Water, Haviland, Rochford, Kent, Pond, Brighton, North River, McGill, Ambrose, Brighton Road, Euston, Queen and Grand Roads.

Returning to the Britannia at 5 o'clock they will go directly via the State dinner at the Charlottetown Hotel via Queen, Fitzroy, Pownall and Kent Streets. After the dinner they will drive at 10:27 p.m. to the Centennial Ball at the Memorial Centre via Kent, Queen and Grand Roads. They will leave the ball at 11:35 to return to the dock via Grafton and Queen Streets.

At 2:30 p.m. they will again leave the Britannia en route to the State dinner at the Charlottetown Hotel via Queen, Fitzroy, Pownall and Kent Streets. After the dinner they will drive at 10:27 p.m. to the Centennial Ball at the Memorial Centre via Kent, Queen and Grand Roads. They will leave the ball at 11:35 to return to the dock via Grafton and Queen Streets.

At 11:43 to proceed to the children's rally at the Exhibition Grounds at a slow speed on a Richmond, Queen, Grafton, Maymound and Kent Streets and Kensington Road at 12:10 they will start for Government House via Kensington, B. 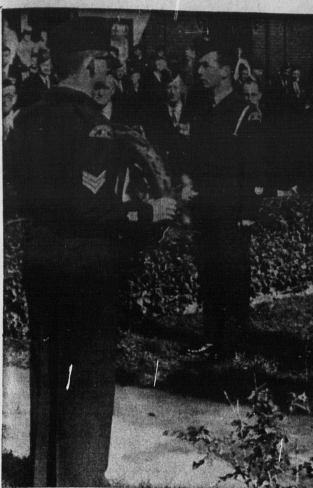

Executive of RCAF Ass'n Opposes Integration Plan

Disagreement of the Royal Canadian Air Force Association's executive council with the unification of the armed forces, as outlined in the government's "White Paper on Defence" and other subsequent papers, was voiced in Charlottetown Thursday by Air Marshal Hugh Campbell (Ret).

Air Marshal Campbell gave the president's address at the Association's 15th annual meeting currently being held at the Confederation Centre.

He said a unified force 10 years from now would have emergency reaction capability, emergency mobility capability, an emergency staying or lasting power, and in the meantime would have lost its esprit de corps and any basis for competition.

"Would anyone suggest that we would have the modern automobile we enjoy today had General Motors, Ford and Chrysler been unified 10 to 15 years ago?" asked the Air Marshal.

The council, he continued, believed that the abolition of the chief of the air staff position was a mistake. We now have an RCAF without a leader or a spokesman. In short, the RCAF is a tribe without a chief," said Air Marshal Campbell.

The air-marshal said Canada is not paying her share to defence for the continued maintenance of peace.

"If we continued to appear so low on the scale of effort, and we are, we would be a laughing stock for a further 10 years," he said.
