

Financial Report To Be Given On Proposed Rink

MONTAGUE — Local area citizens will hear the final reports of committees investigating the financing and construction of a new artificial ice rink at a meeting to be held in the elementary school Tuesday at 8 p.m.

At the last meeting Ralph Beck, president of the Community Welfare League, was appointed chairman of a committee to look into methods of financing and will present a complete report of his investigation to the meeting.

It is estimated that a new rink of this type being planned will cost a minimum of \$80,000 and approximately \$25,000 realized from the sale of the old rink is already on hand. The committee is to advise the meeting regarding the ways and means available to raise the balance. The meeting is open to all in the Montague and surrounding areas.

Women Held Back By Own Inertia Liberal Women Told By President

"It's a good time to be a woman, and a better time to be a Liberal woman," Mrs. J. O. Asselin, national president of the Federated Liberal Women, stated at the annual meeting of the P.E.I. Liberal Women held at the Confederation Centre Saturday.

"It's female inertia—not male resistance which is holding women back," Mrs. Asselin continued. "Woman's role in all the facets of life is changing from passive to active—we must meet the challenge—Lib-

eral women must fill the vacuum."

In regard to Canada's Prime Minister Mrs. Asselin said, "Mike Pearson is recognized all over the world as a great man. Does he have to wait until he's dead and buried before we put the tag on him as being one of Canada's greatest Prime Ministers? There's only one man in Canada who would not agree with this and we all know who he is. Canada is not an easy country to govern even for a flag—we must stand firm. Pearson deserves a majority government."

"How Majesty Queen Elizabeth II should be an inspiration to all Canadian women," Mrs. Asselin said. She conducted her Canadian tour with grace, dignity and courage. During her visit to Quebec, Her Majesty said, "I attach the greatest importance to human relationship." Mrs. Asselin added, "I do."

Mrs. Pearson sent his greetings to the ladies through Mrs. Asselin. He wrote "I extend warm good wishes to the ladies you will meet and thank them for all they have done in the past and will do, I'm sure, in the future."

City's Catholic Youth Week Starts With Giant Rally

The importance of education was stressed by Mayor A. W. Gaudet last evening in the address to over 300 young people from St. Dunstan's Basilica parish at the Basilica Recreation Centre.

The meeting was the kick-off event for Catholic Youth Week, running from Nov. 8 to 15.

Mayor Gaudet said young people today could no longer serve by a modest education. He said students were serving an apprenticeship in schools in preparation for taking over the duties of their parents.

"Our youth is very fortunate in comparison with youth of many other parts of the world because of the opportunities and facilities at their disposal," the mayor said. "He emphasized that these opportunities must be seized, however, and deplored the idea of many young people seem to think they are automatically entitled to the rewards of life."

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Radar Dome Balloon Inflated At N.S. Station

MILL VILLAGE, N.S. (CP) — A huge radar dome balloon was inflated at a satellite ground station in this Nova Scotia south shore community Saturday.

The station is owned by the Canadian division of the worldwide communications satellite system.

Inflation of the balloon, more than 100 feet high and 95 feet in diameter, took about an hour and a half.

It was filled with pressurized air. A transport department said the inflation was a routine operation.

The pumpkin-like radome is to be used as a cover for a dish-shaped antenna, 75 feet in diameter.

The inflation is the first step in a long construction job. It will be another year before the station will be operational.

Many residents of the area turned out to watch the inflation along with transport department officials and officials of the Nova Scotia.

TO LAUNCH SATELLITE — Agreement between Canada and various other governments to take part in the communications system, under Comsat management, was reached earlier this year. It is the first commercial satellite communications system in the world.

Comsat hopes to launch its first satellite next spring.

Besides the United States and Canada, eight other countries will finance the \$200,000,000 satellite system with ground stations around the world and scores of satellites in orbit. Canada's top of the ownership is 3.3 per cent.

The \$5,000,000 ground station at this site is being built on a hamlet village, about 85 road miles southwest of Halifax, where were shown by Nova Scotia breeders.

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relay signals to and from passing ships by telephones, identification, television, facsimile and high-speed data transmission. The \$200,000 radome will house the antenna, built at a cost of \$750,000.

WEIGHS 10 TONS — Its rubberized skin, although only about 1/10th of an inch thick, weighs about 10 tons and is designed to withstand sleet, hail and 120-mile-an-hour winds.

In a control building nearby will be housed computers worth up to \$300,000. To calibrate the 75-foot dish antenna, a 345-foot "tree-ear" tower antenna will be built at Italy Cross, about 7 1/2 miles east of here.

Each of other national groups in the system will have control of its own ground station and internal communication networks.

Canadian Overseas Telecommunication Corporation, a crown corporation, is handling technical aspects of Canada's participation.
