Clinic Uncovers 52 Likely Cases

A total of 233 persons were tested for glaucoma Thursday at the Parkdale WI Hall under the sponsorship of the Parkdale Lions Club. Out of this number there were 15 suspicious cases. The total number tested at the

Piano Team Promises Pleasant Performance

The world-famous piano playing team of Allison Nelson and Harry Neal, who will be making their only P.E.I. appearance tomorrow night at St. Dunstan's University Alumni Auditorium, have chosen some of their favourite selections for the concert.

The opening number, "Overture to Midsummer Night's Dream," by Felix Mendelssohn is played with such tonal effects that one reviewer wrote: "It was performed with lightness and delicacy, as if fairies were sitting about the keyboard." The popularity of this overture, which was written by Mendelssohn when he was only 17, has never waned.

The second number will be Johannes Brahms' "Serenade in A Major, Opus 16," which was transcribed for two pianos from the orchestral score by Brahms himself. A reviewer of Nelson and Neal's performance of this serenade remarked "It was played with brilliance and complete understanding of Brahms the classicist, well balanced and with great artistry."

After an intermission, the concert will take a modern trend with the performance of the "Concertino for Two Pianos, Opus 94," by the Soviet Russian composer, Dmitri Shostakovich.

Next comes Maurice Ravel's "Rhapsodie Espagnole", which was described by one concert reviewer in Georgia as "the highlight of the whole program." The review went on to say that the selection "is a very colorful and exciting one, which requires imagination and great sensitivity to perform with its impressionistic harmonies which sweep the keyboard. It was played with mystical charm, with all the necessary nuances and veiled tonal effects, interwoven with the strong Spanish rhythms of the dances comprising the suite."

The closing number will be

"Reminiscences de Don Juan," by Franz Liszt. Of Nelson and Neal's performance of this selection, reviewer Marita Galt wrote: "The technical requisites for such a number are tremendous, as it is a real display of virtuosity in the grand manner, all of which the artists possessed in the greatest degree."

Nelson and Neal met as students at Philadelphia's Curtis Institute of Music. At that time, Australian-born Allison Nelson was a child prodigy and a protégé of Eugene Ormandy.

Since their marriage they have spent more than a dozen years touring and becoming the world's busiest artists. Their tireless research has produced a startling array of North American and 20th Century premieres of lost or forgotten original works by famous composers. During the off-season months they devote themselves to practice, recording, teaching, writing, and playing with their three children in their seventeen-room mansion in Paris, Tennessee.

Time of the Nelson and Neal concert at SDU is 8 p.m.

Cail Tenders For Forum

Tenders have been called by the City of Charlottetown for sale of the Forum and will be received until Oct. 25.

Following examination of the tenders City Council will have to reach a decision whether to sell the rink or attempt to continue its operation which is now believed to be uneconomical. If a decision is reached to accept any of the tenders submitted it is believed immediate plans will be made for construction of a new rink, possibly as part of a sports complex, in the northwest section of the city where the new high school is to be built.

Persons claiming unemployment benefits with the agent in their local area, and Mr. Winchester said that not only does this help have the congestion at the Charlottetown office, but it is far more convenient for the claimants who are not required to make the trip in to Charlottetown for this purpose.
