'Lighted Home' Winners Picked At Georgetown

GEORGETOWN — The winners of the Georgetown "Lighted Home Contest" have been announced. Taking first prize was the home of Emerson Llewellyn which was awarded the prize on the basis of originality and best representing the Christmas season. Mr. Llewellyn had displayed the nativity scene and exterior lighting. Second prize went to B.H. Stewart. It was awarded on the basis of Christmas lighting decorations and showed an outstanding display of electric wiring wreaths and over 800 colored electric bulbs. Third prize was won by Edward Easton and the judges based their decision on both lights and originality which included a nativity scene, a Santa Claus and reindeer. The contest was open to all citizens of the town but excluded club members from competition. Another Christmas project of the local Lions Club was the procuring and decorating of a large tree. With 60 coloured lights it is located on Kent Street, close to the intersection of Water Street.

Agriculture Minister Sees N.S. Farms In Cost Squeeze

HALIFAX (CP) — Provincial Agriculture Minister I.W. Akertley says Nova Scotia farmers can expect increased cash returns in 1966, but they will also face higher costs. In a year-end review he said gross income of Nova Scotia farm products for the first nine months of 1965 was \$2,500,000 more than the previous year. Gross returns for the entire year were expected to be substantially higher than the \$44,000,000 in 1964. He predicted that net incomes would also rise considerably, but these could not be accurately calculated until complete figures, including expenses, were available. Responsible for the increase were egg, poultry, hog and dairy products. The 3,100,000-bushel apple crop was 700,000 greater than the previous year.

JAKARTA (AP) — The Indonesian government is placing the local distribution of textiles under the control of state-run trading companies. The announcement issued by Trade Minister Ahmad Yusuf during the weekend said this applies to imported as well as locally produced textiles.

Causeway Job Halts Two Weeks

MONCTON (CP) — Land clearing and surveying for the Prince Edward Island causeway will continue Jan. 3 after a temporary halt for the holiday season, it was learned here Tuesday. Equipment and men of Diamond Construction Co. of Fredericton, stopped work Dec. 17 and the surveying crews halted Dec. 23 after five weeks of preparing the approaches at Bayfield, near Cape Tormentine. The Fredericton construction firm is involved in the first phase of the causeway project, including preparation of road and rail approaches on the New Brunswick side.



FORECASTER DIES

Chief Walking Eagle, 76, a Sany Indian known throughout Alberta for his weather predictions based on nature signs, died Monday at the Big Horn Reservation near here. He made his first public weather prediction some 20 years ago when he was interviewed by a newswoman. Once started he continued year after year. In the last five he has been generally accurate. His last forecast, for the 1966 winter was that after a severe storm and cold spell, the weather could be good for the remainder of the season.

N.S. Farmer Claims Net Income Declining

TRURO (CP) — Paul Bishop, retiring president of the Nova Scotia Federation of Agriculture, said Tuesday the position of the farmer has never been worse and net income continues to decline every year. Opening the federation's 70th annual meeting, Mr. Bishop, of Somerset, N.S., said increased operation costs and depreciation coupled with a steady drop in farm income were responsible for the farmer's poor position. (In Halifax Agriculture Minister I.W. Akertley said in a year-end statement that gross farm income in Nova Scotia would be substantially higher this year. He also predicted an increase in net incomes.) Mr. Bishop said farm financing was an important factor and suggested larger amounts of capital and more short-term loans be made available to farmers. A federation directors' report said Nova Scotia hog producers received the best price in Canada because of the provincial marketing system. Mr. Bishop said other segments of the agriculture industry had not made as much progress because no similar co-ordinating program existed. Farmers must be prepared to accept a certain amount of regimentation, he said.

Cars Damaged, No One Injured In Accidents

A City Police report states a car driven by Mrs. Catherine Giggey, city, collided with a parked car owned by Alfred Hennessey city, in front of 51 Euston Street at approximately 5:20 p.m. yesterday. There were no injuries reported and the damage was estimated at \$175. The corner of Euston and Queen streets was the scene of an accident at approximately 11:15 yesterday morning when a vehicle reportedly driven by Allison K. Mutch, 104 Waltham Drive struck a traffic light. The traffic light was broken off as a result of the impact and the lights were out on the Queen — Euston corner. There were no injuries and the damage to the automobile was estimated at \$25. Monday afternoon at 3:55 cars collided near 57 Prince Street. Involved were vehicles driven by Athol Worth, 130 Weymouth Street, and Gerald Curran, Vernon River. The report indicated that the Worth car was parked in front of the Red Cross Centre facing north and the other vehicle was travelling north on Prince Street at the time of the collision. Damage to the Curran vehicle was estimated at \$200 and involved the grill, engine bonnet, radiator, bumper and right front fender. The Worth car received damage to the left rear fender and bumper.
