

Dr. D.I. McGuigan To Get Degree

Dr. Derrill I. McGuigan, son of Mr. and Mrs. Emmet McGuigan, Windsor St., Charlottetown, has earned his PhD in experimental psychology and will have his degree conferred upon him at commencement exercises at Temple University, Philadelphia in January.

Dr. McGuigan has been promoted to a full professor and is chairman of the department of psychology at Ridgeon College, Lawrenceville, New Jersey.

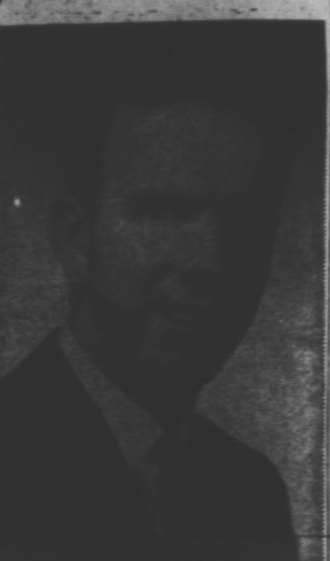
In 1964 he was awarded the \$500 Lindback award as the most distinguished lecturer in the faculty of arts and science.

He is a member of the American Psychological Association, the Eastern Psychological Association and the Association of University Professors.

Dr. McGuigan has had several articles published in psychological journals.

He received a scholarship to Prince of Wales College from St. Patrick's School, Hunter River, later, entering St. Dunstan's University from which he graduated with his BA degree.

He then attended the University of New Brunswick attaining his bachelor of education and master of education degrees. He received a PhD in the history of edu-

Dr. McGuigan taught formerly at St. Patrick's School, Hunter River and Queen Square School, Charlottetown. He also was a lecturer at summer courses at St. Dunstan's and Prince of

U.S.-Russia Counter Missiles Would Be Worry To Canadians

OTTAWA (CP)—Canada, the country in the middle, is hoping that the United States and Russia will reach some mutual understanding not to accelerate the arms race again by building counter-missile systems.

Officials said Wednesday that the U.S. would not need Canadian territory on which to build anti-missile defence bases, which could be constructed within the U.S.

On the other hand, nuclear missile interceptions in such circumstances would take place over Canada and this country would get most of the radioactive fallout.

Thus Canada might want to provide the U.S. with Arctic bases for the proposed Nike-X anti-missile system. This would transfer any space war to high northern latitudes where fallout would be less serious.

HELLYER SAW IT
Defence Minister Hellyer is believed to have been thinking of this latter possibility when he told the Commons-Dee-7 that the current NORAD agreement with the U.S. is unlikely to require major changes in the immediate future "unless a decision is made by the U.S. to deploy an anti-missile defence."

U.S. Defence Secretary Robert McNamara has said there is considerable evidence that Russia has started to build a counter-missile system to defend some of its major cities.

U.S. State Secretary Dean Rusk has indicated the U.S. is considering a major attempt to reach agreement with Russia that the two powers refrain from building expensive counter-missile systems.

Prime Minister Pearson said

in a speech at Scarborough, Ont., last June 25 that deployment of anti-missile defence systems "would be an enormously costly undertaking which in the end would probably lead, as the ballistic missile race did, to ever-mounting defence budgets without any permanent increase in national security or international stability."

He will come here about two months after his visit to President de Gaulle in Paris and his later visit to Turkey.

Kosygin was originally to come in January, but this was postponed a few days because of Wilson's tour of European Common Market capitals to sound out possibilities for British entry into the six-nation community.

SANTIAGO (AP)—An earthquake that collapsed houses and crumpled stone walls rolled across copper-mining country in

Que. Pair Plan Northland Trip

OTTAWA (CP)—A pair of intrepid Quebecers will set out Jan. 15 on a frigid 8,750-mile trip through Canada's north, believed never before attempted.

Paul Comte, 48, father of four, and Armand Levesque 50, who has five children both of Valleyfield told a news conference Wednesday about their plans.

They hope to travel by snowmobiles from Goose Bay, Labrador, to Cape Lisburne, Alaska, arriving some time in May. Their route will keep them far to Canada's north and they expect average temperatures of 46 below zero.

They decided to make the trip two years ago. Then an accidental year approached, they decided to make it their centennial project.

The two have been friends 18 years and hunt and fish together regularly.

Bombardier Snowmobile Ltd., at Valcourt, Que., agreed to provide the vehicles and underwrite the trip and the planning began in earnest.

Inquest Adjourned Until January 16, 67

The non-capital murder charge against John David Nicholson, 65 Crestwood Drive, Charlottetown, has been adjourned until Wednesday morning, Jan 4, 1967.

Nicholson appeared in City Police Court yesterday morning before Magistrate A.J. Haslam, QC. He was represented by Gerald R. Foster, QC.

Later yesterday morning the accused appeared before Mr. Justice R.R. Bell of the Supreme Court and was granted bail at \$10,000, made up of two sureties of \$5,000 each.

The case arose following the death of Robert Anthony Quinn, 27 Charlottetown whose body was found on the city waterfront Tuesday afternoon.

Coroner Dr. C.A. Coody and a coroner's jury viewed the body

at the Charlottetown Hospital yesterday morning and the inquest was then adjourned until Monday January 16, at 7:30 at City Hall.
