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SUPREME COURT.

The Easter term of the Supreme Court opened yesterday in Charlottetown before the full Court.

Arch'd J. McDonald vs. Renton, Administratrix.—The evidence in this case was heard at Georgetown last February, and matters of law were afterwards argued before the Chief Justice in Chambers. A written decision was yesterday read by the Chief Justice giving judgment in favor of the plaintiff for \$293.34 and costs. J. A. Mathieson and W. E. Bentley for the plaintiff; D. A. McKinnon and W. S. Stewart for the defendant.

The application of James D. Hyndman for admission as an Attorney of the Supreme Court was received and the order granted.

Walter Matheson, Appellant, vs. John F. Whear, Respondent.—This case was an appeal from a judgment of the County Court of Queen's County given by Judge Warburton last January against the appellant. Evidence on appeal was yesterday taken and the full Court gave judgment in favor of the Appellant, allowing the appeal, and setting aside the judgment of the Court below. W. E. Bentley and J. D. Hyndman for the Appellant; F. L. Hazard for the Respondent. Court then adjourned till 11 o'clock this morning.

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PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE

WEDNESDAY, May 3.

House met at 12.20.

Mr. M. McKinnon presented a bill incorporating the Grand Lodge, D. T. I. and subordinate Lodges of Good Templars which was read a first time and referred to the Private Bills Committee.

Hon. Mr. MacMillan presented a petition from W. B. Muls, John A. Sharp, Robert T. Holman and other inhabitants and tax-payers of the town of Summerside, praying that an act be passed in amendment to the 'Public Schools Act 1877, that will make women eligible to be appointed to act as School Trustees, which was received and read.

Mr. Wise asked the Commissioner of Public Works what action, if any, has been taken by the past and present Government relative to the building of a building across the North or York River, and the right of way leading from head of New Bedeque Road to the North River by Neil Matheson's Line, and what action, if any, the present Government intend taking this year relative to the same.

Hon. Mr. McLean said the Government had a survey made; but as the work involved considerable expense the matter had been allowed to stand till the present time.

Mr. John A. McDonald asked the Commissioner of Public Works if it is the intention of the Government to widen the road leading from Main Road to the New Bridge on Mill Creek, Lot 14.

Hon. Mr. McLean said the matter had been brought before him and the road would likely be widened during the summer.

House then resumed committee on the bill relating to the appointment of short-hand reporters. The bill was reported agreed to with amendments and set down for third reading to-morrow.

In reply to a question by the Leader of the Opposition Hon. Mr. Farquharson said the estimates would be tabled this week.

THE Y'S CONCERT.

A large number attended at the Y. M. C. A. Hall last night to listen to the concert given by the Y's. This concert was in aid of the flower mission. The programme was a good one and every part was well carried out. Principal Seaman presided with his usual ability. We have not space to particularize, but the choruses given by the members of the C. An intermission was given during the programme, and refreshments—ice-cream and candy—were served. At the conclusion the chairman on behalf of the ladies of the Y's thanked the performers, Principal L. B. Miller of the C. B. C. and others for their kindly assistance. The choruses of the C. B. C. were under the direction of Mr. W. A. McKie who is also a C. B. C., and then we understand that Billy is as popular with his classmates as with the general public. The drills (bar-bell) were under Prof. Hawley, Miss McIsaac and Miss McKie's management.

THE PLANT LINE.—The Plant Line intend running the steamer La Grand Duquesne on the Boston, Charlottetown, Halifax route this year in addition to the Halifax. The Halifax is to leave Boston on her first trip of the season on Saturday May 13th, not on May 6th as before stated, and will leave Charlottetown on return on Tuesday May 16th.

AN OMISSION SUPPLIED.—In noting the success of the Island students at Dalhousie the name of Mr. D. W. MacKenzie, of Flat River, who took an honors course in third year Arts, was unintentionally omitted. Mr. MacKenzie led the pass list in senior physics, and took class II in junior physics. He also took class I in English constitutional history, and passed in political economy.
