DETROIT, Dec. 14 - (CP) - Goalies Terry Sawchuk and Gerry McNeil shared in a rare double shutout as Detroit Red Wings and Montreal Canadiens played to a scoreless deadlock to maintain their one-two positions in the National Hockey League race.

It was the first 0-0 game in the league in 11 months and also marked the first time Wings had been blanked on home ice in 54 games. McNeil did it that time, too.

The goalies were the standouts, since it was by no means a "shell" game-the term applied to a contest with a heavy defensive accent. Play was wide open, as well as rough. Both goalies were exerted on many shots, with Sawchuk making 30 saves to McNeil's 28. The final period, a fast session, saw Detroit carry the shooting edge for the first time, 16-10.

It was the fourth shutout of the campaign for the rival netminders who are hooked up in a tight Vezina Trophy fight. McNeil maintained a one-goal edge over the season's work.
