

Act Gives City Mayor Powers Of Poll-Fixing

An amendment to the City of Charlottetown Incorporation Act, approved in principle in the Legislature yesterday, gives power to the mayor to fix a polling place for more than one ward of the city.

Promoted by Provincial Secretary J. David Stewart, the bill provides that voting for each ward can be carried out in the same building, provided that a deputy returning officer and a clerk shall be present to receive and record the voting separately for each of the wards included "in all respects as though the voting would be held in separate polling places within each ward."

The bill also provides for the closing off of the eastern portion of Sydney Street so that the land may be vested in the city and can be disposed of to Maritime Electric Company Limited.

Another section of the bill closes off the eastern portion of Weymouth Street so that the land can be vested with Canadian National Railways.

According to the bill, the bowling alley and refreshment counter at the YMCA shall be liable to be assessed for civic real property tax and business

occupancy tax and the bowling alley, restaurant and portion of the Basilica Recreation Centre shall be liable to be assessed for civic real property tax and business occupancy tax.

Roads Act '65 Amendment Agreed Upon

Second reading was given in the Legislature last night to the Roads Act 1965, a bill promoted by Highways Minister Philip Matheson.

The minister said it is not a new act but one that ties together previous legislation on the administration and use of public roads.

It was decided to add an amendment to the section dealing with impounding of overweight trucks. The proposal for an amendment was made by Alex Campbell, L-5th Prince, who said under the existing regulations, a driver charged with driving an overweight truck on the highway could suffer financially if unable to retrieve his truck while the case was before the courts.

More Trustees For Protestant Children's Home

Approval in principle was given in the Legislature to a bill to amend the act of incorporation of the P.E.I. Protestant Children's Home to change the number of trustees of the home to 15 from 12.

Promoted by J. Russell Driscoll (P.C.-3rd Queens), the bill says that the trustees "shall be Protestants and shall be 15 in number, of which at least six shall be women."

City Borrowing Is Authorized

Second reading was given in the Legislature yesterday authorizing the City of Charlottetown to issue debentures up to \$270,000 to refund expenditures for permanent works over the year 1964.

Another bill given second reading, authorizes an expenditure of \$340,000 for extensions of water and sewer systems by the Commissioners of Sewers and Water Supply.

The bills were promoted by Provincial Secretary J. David Stewart.

Bill Amends Souris Curling Club Act

Second reading was given in the Legislature yesterday to a bill amending the act of incorporation of the Souris Curling Club.

The bill, promoted by William Acorn (L-1st Kings) says "any surplus or profit derived from carrying on the affairs and business of the club shall be devoted and applied solely in promoting and carrying out its objectives and purposes and shall not be divided among its members or shareholders."

In the event of the winding up of the club, any surplus shall be distributed to a charity or charities.

Attracting Industry Needs Care--Speaker

Lieut. Col. J. K. S. Manuel, president of the Maritime Board of Trade, addressed the general meeting of the Charlottetown Board of Trade held in the Charlottetown Hotel last evening. Col. Manuel spoke on the history and purpose of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce and outlined the accomplishments of the Maritime Board of Trade.

The speaker quoted statistics which showed that the Maritimes have been in the midst of an industrial boom during the last two years. He also issued a word of caution to people in the business of attracting industry. He said that industry should only be attracted if it was suitable to the local area.

Col. Manuel stated that he favored the co-operation of various organizations engaged in furthering the welfare and prosperity of the Atlantic provinces. He also commented on the favorable presence of wives at meetings of board of trade members. He felt that this helped toward understanding the work that the board is doing in the community.

Col. Manuel was thanked by Capt. Claude Hunter, past president of the Maritime Board of Trade. The general meeting was conducted by the president, W. R. Brennan, who mentioned that a delegation had met with officials of Eastern Provincial Airlines regarding flight schedules between the island and the mainland. Mr. Brennan also welcomed the president of the Maritime Board of Trade, Tom Kipping and Ivan Sinclair.

Pulpwood Co. Leases Town Common Lands

GEORGETOWN - Arrangements have been completed with Quigley Pulpwood for the leasing of three common lots for a three-year period and half of another common lot for a one-year period, it was learned at Monday night's council meeting. In all instances there is an option to renew the lease.

The council decided to meet with Laurie A. Coles and Associates, March 29, to discuss the matter of easements for certain town streets, where water and sewage lines will be run to service the food processing plant. This project is proceeding under a grant from the Atlantic Development Board. At next Monday's meeting the council will have its solicitor, John P. Nicholson in attendance.

The council passed a motion requesting the minister of municipal affairs to take the necessary steps to bring in legislation, at the next sitting of the Provincial Legislature, changing the town act, to provide for engaging qualified assessors from outside the town. At present the assessors have to be appointed from the residents of the town and they have to possess the same qualifications as town councillor in respect to ownership of property.

The clerk was authorized to write to W.N. MacLean, M.L.A. for Inverness, N.S., in regard to Mr. MacLean's proposal for the inauguration of a ferry service from Port Hood, N.S., to Georgetown.

The town council here feels that Georgetown is the natural and logical terminal for such a ferry service and in its letter to Mr. MacLean offered to assist in any way in making this service a reality. A copy of the council's letter will be forwarded to John Mullally, M.P., for Kings.

of Agriculture are co-operating to suggest in any grower how he should vote. The effort is confined to making every effort to ensure the grower understands the plebiscite.

The plebiscite does not ask the growers to approve or disapprove of the present board of directors. As announced a few days ago, the new board will comprise three producers, who may also be dealers, named by the dealers of the province, and six producers named by the registered producers, two from each county.

The minister explained that all of the groups participating have agreed on the wording of the plebiscite.

SEEK CONTROL

144 Oz. Of Illicit Liquor Brings Man \$200 Fine

GEORGETOWN - Vernon Gerald Acorn of Murray River pleaded guilty to having liquor in his possession not purchased

from a vendor and was fined \$200 and costs when he appeared here Wednesday before Kings County Magistrate J. B. Johnston, Q.C. The amount of illicit liquor involved was 144 ozs.

Plus Alexander Finner of Souris West was given a two-year suspended sentence and entered into recognition in the amount of \$1,000 to keep the peace, and also made restitution for damage amounting to \$10 when he was sentenced on a charge of breaking and entering and theft of assorted brands of cigarettes and assorted foods at the store of Cheverie Bros. in Souris. The greater part of the stolen goods was recovered.

William Milford Jamieson of Georgetown was fined \$100 and costs or 10 days when he pleaded guilty to a charge of impaired driving.

Malcolm Paul Martell of Georgetown, charged with the theft of two quarts of whisky from the Canadian Legion Home in Georgetown, pleaded not guilty and his case was adjourned to April 7 to allow him to procure legal counsel.

Five persons were each fined \$30 and costs for being intoxicated and four other were each fined \$25 and costs for illegal possession of liquor. Two were fined \$25 and costs for having liquor not purchased from a vendor.

As Ranger IX plunged down at 6,000 miles an hour, the other two craters slid off the screen and the cameras zoomed in on the target point northeast of a 3,000-foot peak inside Alphonse's walls. The impact at 6:08 a.m. PST (10:06 a.m. AST) was only four miles off target, making it the most accurate shot in the series.

Final pictures taken a few miles high showed the flat crater floor—which looked almost smooth in earth-based photographs—pocked by hundreds of meteorite impacts and broken by miles-long cracks or grooves called rills.

The pictures fed live for the first time to the television networks came from a newly-developed device called a scan converter which speeded up signals from the spacecraft so they could be received on standard-broadcast sets. The signals also were recorded as images on film for study by scientists.

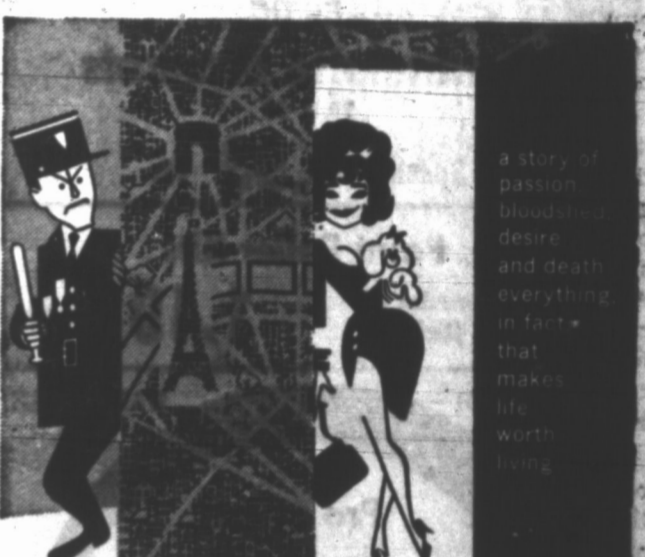
