The Regatta at Summerside on Tuesday was well attended, but owing to the rough weather only two of the races came off.

The long talked of match race between Gen. Butler's yacht America, and Commodore Weld's yacht Gitana, was sailed off Marbledown on Saturday.

SOME troubles are reported in police circles. Officer Foster has informed Marshal Thibodeau that rather than serve any more Scott Act papers for Mr. Grant, he will resign his position on the force. He is still on duty last night, Mr. Foster had some trouble with Mr. Grant on Tuesday, over the Kennedy case. It appears the officer was unable to find Kennedy, and so reported to Mr. Grant, when warm words were exchanged. Officer Foster has been on the force three years and has generally been considered a good officer. He says he is not particular whether he remains on the force or not.—Moncton Times.

MIDSHIPMAN DOUTNEY and three of the nine men in hospital, injured by the explosion of rockets on the Bellefleur, are very low and are not expected to survive. Midshipman Doutney's parents have been cabled for. His sufferings are terrible. The other thirty men who received slight burns and bruises have recovered and are doing duty as usual. It is reported that an investigation will be held into the alleged carelessness of the ship's officers and that a court martial will undoubtedly follow. The more the matter is talked about among the crew, the more miraculous appears the escape of the men from instant death.—Halifax Herald.

AMONG the passengers in the steamer from Pictou last evening was a young lad about ten years of age, who gave his name as James Duncan and said he was from Miss Stirling's Children's Home, Aylesford, N. S., en route to Murray Harbor, to Rev. J. G. Phinney who had adopted him. He was neatly dressed but without money, having, he said, but sixty cents when he left the Home. As soon as he landed from the boat the poor little fellow began crying. He was taken to the Osborne House where he was well cared for during the night. A collection was taken up for his benefit and he was sent to Murray Harbor this morning in the packet Sea Bird.

THE Port Hawkesbury correspondent of the Halifax Herald says it is the general opinion of experienced fishermen that if the large fleet of seiners that were in the North Bay had been jigging mackerel, as in days gone by, they could have kept the body of fish that went in the bay this summer with the large quantity of bait they would distribute; whereas when they could get no bait, the fish left and they think the mackerel that are now being caught in the American shore are the same that were caught in the bay. As proof of this they state that the mackerel caught in the bay in July had small tinkers in them, about two inches in length, whereas those lately caught had tinkers in them about four inches long, which shows that on account of not getting bait in the North Bay they had to eat the small fish.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

Davitt's Parting Remarks.

QUEENSTOWN, Sept. 22. Michael Davitt sailed on the steamship Britannic to-day for New York. He said the doctors had ordered an ocean journey. He proposed to make no public appearances in the United States. The order for the suppression of the League would neither intimidate the members nor either in the least degree set back the popular movement. It was simply impossible now to crush the movement, that would mean to put in prison three-fourths of the population of Ireland. We must fight. We must make sacrifices for the principle of self-government. I have already served nine years in prison. On returning to Ireland I have a good prospect of putting in more years in prison. I believe every earnest Nationalist is ready to do the same. It would be infinitely more agreeable if we could continue the struggle in a peaceful, constitutional manner, but the Tory Government will not let us.

Justin McCarthy Again.

LONDON, Sept. 22. Justin McCarthy in a lecture last evening said no man in his senses, not even Mr. Smith or Mr. Balfour, could conceal from himself the fact that the Home Rule question was settled, and that it only remained to arrange the terms. The Irish would have their parliament, and he trusted that the commercial prosperity of Ireland would be restored.

Cholera in Rome.

Rome, Sept. 22. The successor of the prefect of Messina, who recently died of cholera also succumbed. A number of chemists and physicians who became panic-stricken fled from Messina, pursued by the police, were taken back. The mob shot a postman under the impression that he spread the epidemic through letters which he distributed.

Collision on the Intercolonial.

QUEBEC, Sept. 22. News has been received of a serious railway collision on the Intercolonial between St. Maurice and Little Metis. The engineers of both trains are reported killed. Beyond this no particulars can be learned, as all inquiries for details are ignored by the railway people.

The Verdict.

LONDON, Sept. 22. The coroner's verdict in the collision on the Midland Railway to-day rendered a verdict of manslaughter against Taylor, the engine driver and fireman of the express train from Liverpool.

O'Brien's Trial.

LONDON, Sept. 22. The mayor and municipal authorities, clergymen and other distinguished residents of Cork will attend the trial of O'Brien, in order to show their sympathy with him.

Gone to Nova Scotia.

OTTAWA, Sept. 22. Hon. Mr. McLelan left this afternoon for Nova Scotia. He will be absent some time as the trial of the election petition against him is to come off next week at Truro.

Arrested for Embezzlement.

PARIS, Sept. 22. M. Cronsel, director of the Journal Estafette, has been arrested on a charge of embezzling 177,500 francs belonging to the association of Republican journalists.

To Resign.

LONDON, Sept. 22. Wm. J. Evelyn, Conservative member for Deptford, has threatened to resign rather than support the Government's cruel measures in Ireland.

Lost in the Floods.

LONDON, Sept. 22. It is reported beyond Wady Halfa, that hundreds of lives were lost in the floods, caused by the rising of the Nile.

Home Rule Resolutions.

BELFAST, Sept. 22. Resolutions in favor of Home Rule were adopted at a mass meeting held in this city on Wednesday.

More Earthquake.

MADRID, Sept. 22. An earthquake in Malaga to-day caused a panic among the people. There was no damage.
