

Local and Other Items.

HERRING are reported plentiful around the coast.

A NOVA SCOTIA BARNED Cameron, recently sold 73 acres of land near Port Moody, B. C., for \$25,000.

A GENTLEMAN from Tracadie reports that a large steamer passed to the westward on Sunday, and that a large vessel is at present stuck in the ice of Tracadie Harbor.

MR. GARDNER, Dominion Immigration Agent at St. John, has forwarded over eighty applications to Quebec for female servants wanted by parties in New Brunswick.

It is rumored that Hon. A. W. McLean is to be knighted on the 24th May. Mr. McLean belongs to a Colchester family who have been a long time in political life.

A BOY named Campbell, son of Mr. Campbell, Summerside, fell from the deck to the hold of a large vessel on the stocks in Hon. John LeFurgey's shipyard, and was seriously, if not fatally injured.

A LABORER named Owen Callaghan, met with a slight accident to his face while at work this morning on board the barque Lucy Pope. A hatch gave way and falling, struck him edgewise on the face, inflicting a ghastly wound on the nose.

HIS HONOR THE LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR received a telegraphic despatch last evening Lord Melgund, the Governor General's secretary, stating that the announcement as to the postponement of the celebration of Her Majesty's Birthday, has reference to official celebrations only.

THE Royal Society of Canada's assemblies in Ottawa on Tuesday. His Excellency has invited the members to dinner on Tuesday evening. It is understood that immediately after the meeting of the Royal Society, Lord Lansdowne and party will leave for Quebec to take up their summer quarters at the citadel.

RICH deposits are being struck in the Rocky Mountains. There is no 'boom,' but plenty of steady paying work, placer mining bringing in from \$5 to \$30 a day. A letter from the end of the track says a miner named Edward Robson cleared \$320 in a week with a pick, shovel and washpan in the Selkirk. —Winnipeg Sun.

ABOUT eighty plasterer's laborers went on strike in Toronto on Saturday morning for increase from \$1.70 to \$1.80 per day. Non-union bosses granted the increase. Others positively refused. Over one hundred plasterers thrown out of work through the strike, and work on a large number of buildings has been suspended.

It is stated that the steamships at Philadelphia are taking grain to Europe at the same rate as from Montreal, and the rate from Chicago to Philadelphia is the same as to Montreal—thirteen cents. The Pennsylvania railroad as well as the Grand Trunk is now quoting rates to Liverpool at less than the regular rates to New York.

THE dullness in the grain transportation trade still forms a leading topic of conversation on 'change, in Montreal. There is now a little confusion in the grain market and operators who are beginning to realize the situation do a little panic talk. Only one vessel so far this season, is en route from Chicago to Montreal loaded with wheat.

THE trial of the prisoners in the Harbor Grace affray is progressing slowly, seven witnesses only have been examined in three days, and their evidence as to the identification of the prisoners is so contradictory that it does not stand the test of cross-examination or agree with the former testimony. An important crown witness swore that both bodies rushed together simultaneously, when Jean, the first man, fell and both bodies were in a tangle.

HISTORICAL PAINTING.—An Ottawa despatch to the Halifax Herald says: The picture of the Quebec confederation convention, which was ordered last year to be placed in the parliament buildings here, was to-day put on view at the main entrance to the house of commons. The size of the oil painting is 15 by 11 feet. The party are engaged in discussing the basis of confederation, the place being the old parliament house of Quebec. The representatives are sitting around a long table, Sir E. P. Tache in the chair, Sir John (then Mr. McDonald), is supposed to be speaking, and Dr. Tupper is in the act of rising to ask him a question. The province of Nova Scotia is represented by Tupper, Henry, Archibald, Dickey and McCully. The picture, which is much admired, is the work of the well-known artist, Mr. Harris, of Prince Edward Island.

AMONG the matters that will come before the Grand Jury at its next sitting in Charlottetown is a case of assault upon Mr. James Curtis, Deputy Sheriff of Queen's County. It appears that the Deputy Sheriff had an execution out of the Supreme Court against one James Leonard, of South Shore; and he went over for the purpose of executing the execution. In this performing his duty, Mr. Curtis was assaulted by Leonard with a pitchfork and prevented from executing the writ. An information was laid before Messrs. Heard and Tomlins, two Queen's County Magistrates and they, having heard the evidence, committed Leonard to jail to stand his trial at the Supreme Court. We think that parties having executions against them would command more sympathy if they would submit to the law and not obstruct the sworn officers in the discharge of duties, which in many cases are as unpleasant to the Sheriff as to the parties themselves.

COLLISION AT GEORGETOWN.

A SCHOONER SUNK.

ALL HANDS SAVED.

GEORGETOWN, May 20.

Yesterday afternoon the schooners Noon-day, Captain Dixon, and the Frank A. Williams, Captain Malone, both of Gloucester, Mass., collided about one mile southeast of Panmore Island Light. The Noonday filled in fifteen minutes, and sank in four fathoms of water. Her crew were picked up by the schooner Ocean King, and landed safely in Georgetown. The Frank A. Williams kept on to sea, considerably worse of the crack. She, it appears from what can be gleaned, was on the right tack. Both vessels were bound to Magdalen Islands to bait for a trawling trip in the Bay.

Bombardment of Suakin.

CAIRO, May 19.

Two hundred rebels bombarded Suakin to-day, the attack lasting one hour. Two of the inhabitants were wounded. The rebels succeeded in stealing 1000 sheep, and then retired. The rebels have captured the government magazine at Aba Hamed and virtually possess the town. The rebels are advancing upon Korosko and general alarm has been created. El Mahdi's emissaries continue to advance and are welcomed everywhere.

More Trouble Expected.

WINNIPEG, May 19.

Trouble is expected from the Indians in the Northwest. Chief Piapot insists that his band must have a reservation where they can get fresh fish and clams, and that this is necessary to counteract the effects of the bac-n, which has spread scurvy among his people and caused the death of fifty. He complains of bad treatment at the hands of the Government. Yellow Calf's band are reported to be well armed, and defying the authority.

Another Bank Failure.

NEW YORK, May 18.

The Erie County Savings Bank, of this city, suspended this morning. Its capital is \$150,000, and its liabilities \$300,000. It is said that the President has been dabbling in oil. He has left the city.
