STIFFER PENALTIES FACE MOTORISTS IN NEW ACT

By DON MACLEOD When the new Highway Traffic Act, given effect last week, comes into effect, motorists who run foul of the act will find that not only have the majority of the penalties been increased but also the range of infractions has been expanded.

According to the new act, "no person shall drive upon a highway a motor vehicle equipped with a television set or carrying a television set while such is in operation."

Upon conviction of an infraction of this rule, a person could be fined from \$10 to \$100, or sentenced to four to 30 days in jail.

The new Act conveniently summarizes, in schedule form, the offences and penalties that apply in connection with various phases of motor vehicle operation.

What is probably the stiffest penalty in the act is the one that could be levied against a person acting as a dealer without a dealer's trade license.

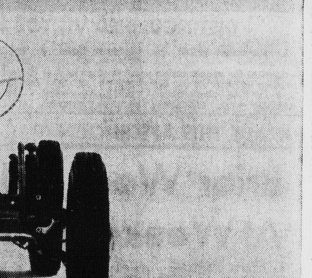

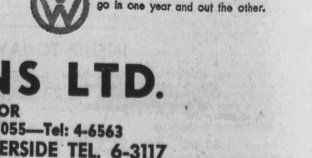
