

# Weather Helps Restore Services In St. John's

 ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP)—Line services were restored to St. John's Wednesday, but power lines were still down in the 10,000 residents were struggling along without power following the weekend storm.

No serious injuries were reported here or on the island during the storm. Thieves in St. John's made off with a worthless \$20,000 bond from the Bank of Montreal during the blackouts and some \$7,000 was reported stolen from a Bell Island supermarket.

Thomas Lowe, 19, was convicted of the bank theft. Power officials called the black-out the worst in Newfoundland's history. First reports filtering in from Conception Bay communities Wednesday said it was the worst since electricity was first brought there 50 years ago.

Like Match Sticks  
 A Spaniard's Bay, Conception Bay, resident reported "new heavily creosoted poles installed last summer snapped like match sticks" under the tons of ice.

An estimated 100 poles are down between Avondale on Conception Bay and Hearts Content on Trinity Bay, a distance of about 30 miles.

The Canadian National Telegraphs' relay station at Heart's Content was knocked out Wednesday, disrupting services between Newfoundland and mainland centres for about four hours. It was not known for sure if this trouble was connected with the storm.

Repairs continued to work on fallen wires in St. John's Wednesday and officials said it would probably be another week before things get back to normal.

No one had power for 21 hours Saturday and very few sections had it Sunday. A line was brought up from south shore hydro stations Tuesday and power rationing ended.

# Highway Accidents Account For 13 Deaths in P.E.I. '57

Highway traffic accidents claimed the lives of thirteen (13) persons, and injured two hundred and ninety-six (296) in Prince Edward Island during the calendar year 1957, according to figures released today by an official of the Motor Vehicle Branch.

The report shows a numerical increase of three (3) in the number of persons killed and an increase of twenty-nine (29) in the number of persons injured over the year 1956.

The following is a comparative statement of particulars relative to highway traffic accidents for the year 1956, and 1957, with the figures for 1956 appearing in brackets:

Total number of accidents, including fatal, non-fatal and property damage accidents, 759 (744). Fatal 13 (15), Non-Fatal 746 (729). Property damage only 54 (59).

Of the thirteen persons killed in 1957 nine (9) were drivers, two (2) were passengers, and two (2) were pedestrians. In the number of persons injured, one hundred and twenty-two (122) were drivers, one hundred and thirty-five (135) were passengers, thirty (30) were pedestrians, and five (5) were bicyclists.

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Under ideal road and weather conditions, with the vehicle involved being in good mechanical condition and the driver being apparently normal, which only serves to emphasize the point that hazardous haste is the big cause of all these accidents.

Sure, there are a lot of causes for traffic accidents. Mechanical failure, inadequate highways, and pedestrian carelessness, to name just a few. But in traffic fatalities especially on the open highway investigators generally always find in the shambles, evidence of some speed offence in a large percentage of these accidents.

Many Forms  
 Death dealing speed takes many forms. Exceeding posted limits is a major one. Failure to yield right-of-way. Slipping past that stop sign... Driving too close... Passing without a clear distance ahead and others all tend to show the spirit of dangerous haste.

But no matter what form it takes, hazardous haste always begins in the mental attitude of the driver who guides the steering wheel and controls the gas pedal and brake. His mental attitude is that of a person who takes chances with his life and the lives of others, carelessly or recklessly, because of his "hurry up" psychology.

A large majority of these accidents could be avoided if every driver and pedestrian would learn to "Slow Down And Live".

# Bull Owned By Farmer In Victoria Is Reserve Champ

Mr. Boswell also noted that he was the only Prince Edward Island breeder to have an animal of his own breeding nominated for all Canadian this year. She was Lealand's Treasurer's Pet, 1st prize junior heifer calf at the Maritime Winter Fair last fall. She also won at Crapaud.

The other resident of Charlottetown and the one from Halifax were each given suspended sentences of 10 and 20 days respectively, while the resident of Kinkora was fined \$5 and costs or five days.

For failing to stop at a red traffic light residents of Rocky Point and Cornwall were each fined \$10 and costs while a resident of Charlottetown charged with the same offence was fined \$15 and costs.

Convicted of operating a taxi without a taxi driver's license a resident of Charlottetown was fined \$10 and costs.
