Inspection Slated Of Militia Group

Units of 2 Militia Group will undergo their annual inspection at 7:30 this evening. The inspecting officer will be Col. R.J. Graham, DSO, CD, colonel general staff, Eastern Command Headquarters, Halifax.

The parade, commanded by Col. Graham, will be taking over from Major-General M.P. Bogert, CBE, DSO, ED, GOC Eastern Command, who will be absent because of illness.

Other members of the inspecting party will be Lt-Col. R.F. MacKay, MC, CD, GSO 1 Eastern Command; Lt-Col. L. Atack, AMG 1, Eastern Command; and Lt-Col. M.W. Lawrence, CD, Eastern Command.

City's Proposed Dump Site Sparks Fireworks

Two delegations waited on the government yesterday morning in regard to land purchased by Charlottetown in East Royalty for a garbage disposal site. One, a City Council delegation, sought a paved road leading into the site while the other, composed of representatives of East Royalty, presented a strong petition against the proposed move by the city.

The petition developed from a meeting Tuesday night in East Royalty where more than 100 people expressed "great disapproval of the idea of establishing a city dump within their district boundaries."

Malcolm Gaudet, a spokesman for the group, said that Charlottetown's Mayor A. Walter Gaudet "shows gross ignorance when he suggested the city people come to another area to dump their garbage."

The petition was presented by the East Royalty Improvement Committee and was presented to Provincial Secretary J.D. Stewart and G. Claude Smith, director of town planning.

It was stated that landowners will not give any property to provide the 66-foot width road that would have to be built leading into the dump site.

CITY HAS BEEN LAX?
The provincial government has been trying for years to get the City to clean up its dump, but without success. We feel we'd get the same treatment," the district spokesman observed.

The main highway to some of the most important tourist spots and provincial parks in the eastern part of the province "will be littered with garbage, just as the road in the present dump lot," it was added.

And the people of the area want no more rats, up to a foot in length, that abound in the present dump area," the spokesman said.

BEHIND THE BARN
Asked this morning about the reactions of the East Royalty people, in general, one resident said, "If we had some of those city people out behind the barn for a few minutes we'd talk to them."
