CORRESPONDENCE.

We do not hold ourselves responsible for the
opinions or statements of our correspondents.
To the Editor of the Examiner.

DEAR SIR,—The Directors of the old
Bank are silent as the grave, and it is to be
feared their remains will descend into that
receptacle unwort, &c. &c. The wail of
the widow and the orphan is crying to
heaven for vengeance if reparation be not
made. The Directors of the Bank either
knew the Bank was being ruined, or they
did not. If they knew its condition they
should stand before the world convicted of
fraud. If they did not know it are they
not guilty of gross and criminal negligence?
Why are the Directors appointed in a Bank
if not as a safeguard in the management of
the institution? What right have the
public to blame the Cashier, Mr. Joseph
Brecken, any more than the seven gen-
tlemen whose portraits figure in Meacham's
Atlas as the guardians and custodians of the
old Bank? Each party had his sphere
and duty assigned to him, and without
any desire to wound the feelings of these
gentlemen, seven blocks of wood would
have guarded the funds equally as well.
Ignorance of the law does not excuse
ordinary citizens from the consequences of
their actions, and if the Directors were
ignorant of the condition of the Bank up to
the memorable 23rd of November last—
their ignorance has led to serious results
which affect a large portion of the popu-
lation of this Island and makes their con-
duct more heinous and criminal. It is
criminal to this extent that a halo of
respectability attached to the seven gen-
tlemen occupying the position of Directors, and
it appears to me the only purpose which they
served was to act as decoys to lead
the public into the idea that with
such men as Directors the Bank was
sound, coupled with the fact that they
publicly declared semi-annual divi-
dends as evidence of the prosperity and
good condition of the bank.

The Directors not guilty! If they knew
not their duty or could not learn or acquire
it, they should, as honest men, decline
the position? If they knew their duty, and
it is hard to believe they did not, are they
not guilty for the neglect of so important a
duty?
Why did they not bring back the cashier?
He is certainly guilty, and could be found?
He has rich friends to whom the loss of
seventy or eighty thousands would be as
nothing compared with the people who are
called upon to lose their hundreds, and
they have a right to come to his rescue. The
fact of the matter is, depositors and others
stood back in order not to embarrass the
bank in resuming. They lost precious time
which cannot now be easily regained.
Unity of action and a determination of
purpose may aid parties yet, and the deposi-
tors who are not shareholders should meet
and arrange as to mode of procedure against
these parties who will lead the van and
marsh the forces against the Directors
and cooperation of the Bank of P. E. I.
Everybody says something ought to be
done, but it is useless to talk without
combining. Will some one of the city
depositors, or several of them, call a meet-
ing and let a fund be raised to aid in
obtaining redress in the matter complained
of. If nothing else can be done some sound
and serious advice can be tendered to those
parties which may be serviceable to them
in their future career or cause them to
disgorge at once. Where there is a
legal right there is a legal remedy,
and the law will create a remedy fit for the
occasion, although contrary to the em-
phatic assurance of the wisest of men
(though hand join in hand, the wicked
shall not be unpunished) criminals do
occasionally slip and escape the punish-
ment which might seem due to their mis-
deeds. Let Mr. Brecken be extradited. If
the Executive authority of this Province
make a demand upon the authorities in the
State where he resides, they will deliver
him up, or the tribunals of justice will de-
vise ways and means of bringing him
back. Then we may find out the truth,
the whole truth, and nothing but the truth,
from the head downwards. Will they rise
and explain, and show how they obtained
their semi-annual dividends, &c., and
managed the deposits?

A Claim for \$25,000 Damages.
A month or two ago the Mayor of Polk
City, Iowa, was killed by some person or
persons unknown. Shortly afterward a
mob, which probably contained the real
murderers, fixed upon one Willis Delaine
as the guilty party, so they hung him on a
tree until he confessed the crime; a man
with a rope around his neck will generally
confess to anything, no matter who is the
real criminal, if by so doing he can escape
being choked to death. Mr. Delaine was
thereupon taken to jail; he was afterwards
brought to trial and acquitted. He now
sues members of the mob for twenty-five
thousand dollars damages. It is to be
hoped he will succeed. Every member of
a lynch party is at heart a murderer,
and it is a safe rule to suspect the leader of
a mob is either the perpetrator of the crime
which he professes to be burning to avenge,
or is the tool of the criminal. When the
men who assaulted Mr. Delaine are arraign-
ed, the remaining inhabitants will have a
chance to learn who really constitute the
dangerous class in their midst.

THE LABRADOR FISHERY.—A number of
the Labrador fishing fleet, which arrived at
Fort Mulgrave on Tuesday, on their way
home, report the codfishery a total failure on
the Labrador coast.

The Markets.

OATS.
The price of oats in England this
season is anticipated to commence at
18s. to 18s. 6d. per quarter of 304 pounds.
This price is, after all deductions for ex-
penses are made, equivalent to 32 or 34
cents per bushel here. We hope our ex-
porters will receive and ship a better
quality of oats this than they shipped
last year. It is to be regretted that so
many of last spring's cargoes were landed
in the British and foreign markets in such
a heated condition, as it will have a bad
effect on buyers this fall.

BUTTER.
Butter seems to have had a temporary
rise in Ontario. One dealer, in order to
raise the market, invested \$25,000 in stock,
and thus for a time his aim will be accom-
plished. But is expected the high price
will not continue long. Butter seems
scarce all round, and complaints of the
scarcity come from Moncton, St. John and
Halifax.

CHEESE.
The recent advance in the price of cheese
in England has been followed by a good ad-
vance in Ontario, and stock is held at from
11 cents to 11½ cents per pound. Island
factory cheese is selling here at the same
price.

EGGS.
In Boston, eggs are in good demand at a
high price—24 and 25 cents per dozen being
obtained for Island stock. A decline in
this price, however, is anticipated.

FISH.
A Boston circular of the 19th, says:—
Owing entirely to the foggy weather, our
shore fleet have done poorly the past week.
Total receipts from the fleet at this and
outports have been 11,471 bbls. for the
week, against 24,560 bbls. for correspond-
ing week a year since. On account of the
falling off in receipts and poor reports
from the fleet, our market is ruling
firmer. With a return of clear weather
we may reasonably look for an increase in
receipts, as the waters appear to be full of
mackerel. Sales of shore mackerel have
been made at \$5.50 to \$6 for 3's; \$8 for 2's;
and \$10 for 1's in fairs. Island mackerel,
med. 3's, \$6; lge. 3's, \$7; 2's, \$8 to \$9; as
to quality. As long as our shore mackerel
will continue as at present quite fat, we find
it difficult to obtain any advance on above
quotations for the Island fish which are of
fair size but have no fat. Herrings, Nova
Scotia large shore, quiet at \$5; round, \$2.50
to 2.75; George's Bay gibbed a little quiet
at \$3.8 to \$5.25; pickled codfish \$5 to
\$5.50. Haddock \$4 to \$4.25; these fish
should be fresh from the knife, well
cleaned and not bench cured fish.
Large dry codfish, \$6 to \$6.25 per qt.;
hake, \$3; haddock, \$3 to \$3.25; pollock,
\$3 to \$2.25, quick and wanted; box her-
rings, quick at \$21 for mediums; \$15 to
\$16 for 1's; \$13 to \$14 for tucks; \$12 for
lengthways.

CANNED LOBSTERS.—A slight improve-
ment in demand, making holders quite firm
at \$1.25 and \$1.28, Canned Mackerel \$1.05
per dozen, high prices for fish leads us to
expect full figures on these goods.
Arabi's Preparations for Retreat.
A United Press cable from Port Said,
dated Aug. 20, says:—Your correspondent,
in an interview with a native well posted in
regard to the situation of affairs, learned
that before the occupation of Ismailia and
Kantara all the military stores, provisions,
breadstuffs, etc., were shipped to the
interior, and that Arabi has for some time
been prepared to surrender all the cities,
towns, etc., within reach of the guns of
the fleet, knowing the utter impossibility of
making a successful defence against their
heavy guns. He states that Arabi is well
prepared to give the British troops a warm
reception the moment he gets them well
from under the cover of the guns of the
fleet. Arabi had expected that the British
would immediately occupy Kantara and
Ismailia, but that it in no way alarmed him,
he having received an assurance from the
false Prophet that ere the British troops
could muster sufficient force to march on
Cairo he would form a junction with Arabi's
troops, and that he was now making forced
marches in that direction. His force is
estimated at from 40,000 to 60,000 men,
which is being constantly recruited from
the natives of the country on the line of
march.

The Good Fellow.
What is it to be a "good fellow?" Some-
times death takes from a community a man
