Describes Return To Sound Economy In New Zealand

Enjoying the bountiful gifts of soil, climate and scenery, New Zealand people also have a relatively high standard of living after having returned to the sound and sensible economic way of ordered freedom and personal liberty, said His Excellency T. C. A. Hislop, C.M.G., High Commissioner for New Zealand to Canada, at Rotary luncheon yesterday.

In the dark days of 1935-36 it was possible for some politicians to persuade the people that their difficulties were due to government policies and New Zealand entered upon an experiment in socialism and became the Commonwealth "guinea pig" in testing the ideas of government direction of every kind of the economy, the speaker said.

The people of New Zealand are proud of their place in the Commonwealth of Nations and have responded notably to every call for troops, food supplies and war material. Many New Zealand airmen were trained in Canada and had warm appreciation of the hospitality shown them by Canadians.

The increase of expenditure to date this year amounts to \$16,426.41 over the expenditures for the same period a year ago it was stated in the financial report prepared by Councillor Prowse and read by Councillor L. O'Donnell.

The increase of receipts over the same period this year was \$29,521.82 above that of a year ago, the report continued. Total expenditures to date have amounted to \$273,117.99 against \$256,688.58 a year ago. The big items in expenditures are interest on debentures, school board and Street Department which make up over 80 per cent of the money spent 10 date.

The total amount of real estate taxes this year have amounted to \$140,269.24 or \$27,374.47 more than the \$117,894.74 collected during the same period last year.

Personal property taxes showed an increase of \$1403.45 over those collected to this date last year. \$52,966.13 have been collected this year in comparison with \$51,532.63 a year ago.

NO CERTAINTY (Continued from Page 1) four negotiators. The Peiping radio said Monday night they were leaving Pyongyang for Kaesong.

A party of 40 American engineers ran into a large group of Chinese soldiers about five miles southeast of Kaesong. "A Chinaman took out a knife and drew a line across the road," one of the engineers related. "He told us in broken English, 'We work this side of the line; you work that side'."

The Americans and 20 South Korean laborers had worked about eight miles beyond U.N. lines without finding any mines when they sighted the Chinese. The American officer said he could see between 200 and 300 Chinese on the road north.

Naval Recruiting Plans For Women

Plans for recruiting women into the Royal Canadian Navy (Reserve) will be under way at Naval Headquarters, Ottawa, W.R.C.N.S. will be recruited to handle many jobs at present being done by men in order that in times of emergency they will be capable of taking over these jobs.

Among the shore duties they will be assigned are those of communications, writers, storewomen, naval airwomen (fitters, riggers and safety equipment workers), meteorological observers, radar plotters and seaward defence watchkeepers.
