Brooklyn Dodgers Soar To 10th Straight Win For Modern Major League Record

(By The Associated Press)
Brooklyn Dodgers soared to their 10th straight victory—a modern major league record from the start of the season—by smashing Philadelphia Phillies ace pitcher Robin Roberts 14-4 Thursday at Ebbets Field.

The Dodgers' triumph high-lighted an abbreviated four-game program in the major leagues which produced American League triumphs for New York Yankees, Washington Senators and Chicago White Sox, New York Giants' game at Pittsburgh was postponed by bad weather—the only other contest on the schedule.

Yankees smothered Baltimore Orioles 14-2 with Bob Turley throwing a five-hitter against his former teammates. It was the second five-hit victory of the season for the young fireballer who was the principal figure in an 18-player trade between the two clubs during the winter.

The White Sox thumped the Tigers 9-1 at Detroit, with George Kell's grand slam home run the big blow of the game. Washington edged Boston Red Sox 1-0 in the ninth on Pete Runnels' single which scored Roy Sievers.

HEAVIEST BATTING

Dodgers unleashed their heaviest batting display of the season in continuing their remarkable string. They clubbed Roberts for 11 hits and 10 runs, including three home runs, in four innings and continued their onslaught against two relievers.

In the final accounting, the Dodgers had 17 hits, which included four home runs and as many doubles. Shortstop Don Zimmer, playing for injured Pee Wee Reese, poled a home run, two doubles and a single. Carl Furillo banged out four straight singles.

American Hockey League Names All-Star Team

NEW YORK (AP)—Frank Mathers, Pittsburgh's perennial all-star defenceman, was the only unanimous choice for the 1954-55 American Hockey League all-star team, but his teammate, goalie Gil Mayer, ran him a close second.

The team, selected by votes of sports writers and broadcasters in the six league cities, was released today by the AHL service bureau.

Mathers drew a maximum of 30 points in the voting on the basis of five points for a first-place vote, three for second and one for third. It was the fourth consecutive year Mathers has been named for the all-star team and his second unanimous selection.

Mayer, the Hornets goalie who has been the league leader in that position four of his six years in the AHL, received 28 points.

Other first team selections were Gordon Tottle, Springfield defenceman, Ross Lowe, Springfield, centre, Eddie Olson, Cleveland left wing, and Fred Glover, Cleveland right wing.

Canadiens Have Five Players Selected For Current All-Star Team

MONTREAL (CP)—Montreal Canadiens, losers to Detroit Red Wings in the Stanley Cup final, won five of the 12 places on the 1954-55 National Hockey League's all-star teams.

The teams, chosen by hockey writers, broadcasters and telecasters in the six NHL cities, were announced Thursday by the NHL headquarters. The teams, with the number of votes for each player in brackets:

First team: Goal, Lumley, Toronto (152); defencemen: Harvey, Montreal (174); Kelly, Detroit (151); centre: Beliveau, Montreal (151); right wing: Richard, Montreal (138); left wing: Smith, Toronto (147).

Second team: Goal: Savchuk, Detroit (128); defencemen: Gahm, Detroit (65); Flaman, Boston (47); centre: Mosdell, Montreal (51); right wing: Geoffrion, Montreal (105); left wing: Lewicki, New York (67).

NHL clubs had three first choices, three seconds and three thirds. The most points a player could earn for the two half-seasons would be 180.

Montreal's Doug Harvey ended with more points than any other player—174 out of the possible 180.


Jean Beliveau, sophomore sensation with the Canadiens, had little competition for the centre on the first team. The voting was close for centre on the second team. Montreal's Ken Mosdell edged out Toronto's Ted Kennedy by one vote.

Each player on the first team receives \$1,000 from the NHL while each member of the second team gets \$500.

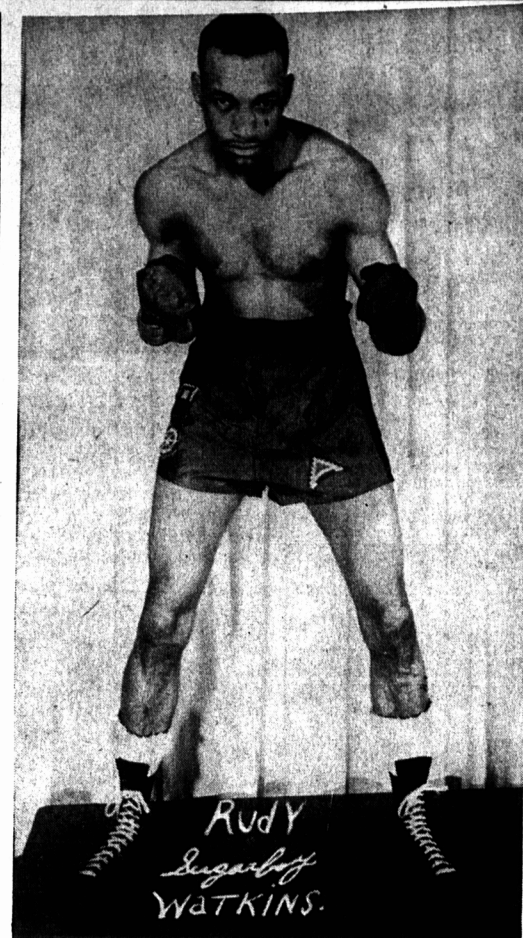

Back to their native land, Tom "One Man McCluskey" of this city and Jack Grant of Peake's met in the fistie ring in the market hall in Charlottetown in February 1912; both had returned home after a successful campaign in American rings.

Although the bout was only a six round exhibition, it proved very satisfactory to the large crowd in attendance. There was no decision given. The bout was capably handled by Jim Smart, Kid Lafferty was McCluskey's chief second. Grant was seconded by his brother, Lafferty issued a challenge to any welter weight on the Island and it was immediately accepted by Jack A'hern of Tignish.

Westling was also a popular sport on the Island in the early 1900's. Among the most famous mat men who performed locally, were such world famous names as Dan Macdonald, Harry Lewis, Paks the Greek, Police Officer, Jim Walker, George Nedeff and Jim Smart.

M. J. Mooney of Iona made a name for himself, fighting in Calgary rings, some forty-five years ago. He fought in the Welter weight division and at one time he held the Western Canadian title in that division.

Eddie Arsenault of Summerside did considerable boxing in Western Canadian rings. He left this province around 1910. He fought in the Feather weight division and he fought under the name of Eddie Franks.

Shortly before World War II, Benny Binnis of Charlottetown was the most feared mat man in local rings. He possessed a terrific knock-out punch. Often Binnis would enter the ring with opponents 40 to 50 lbs. heavier than himself. Among the battlers that he fought in his day, were George Eslie, George Graham, Johnnie Nemis, Bobby Orr, Bobby Allan, Leo Kelly, Bill Longphie, Flash Macdonald, Tom Claybourne. At the time Binnis was fighting in local rings there was still another Island boy making good in New England rings, he was Joe Rice of Souris, at that time Rice only weighed around 145 lbs.
