Twilight Gathers Nature Into Its Gentle Embrace

James interrupted his choring to stop a moment by the door this evening. "I'll be coming to supper shortly now, Ellen," he promised. "I have to stable the cows yet, and..." his voice faded in the distance.

The table was spread. The meal prepared. We had sliced the cold roast pork, and made fish, as best we could with the tools at hand, which after all, is said to be the mark of a good workman! When we number our blessings and we consider them to be legion - the thought will intrude that we might after all have been granted an husband, who would have taken an interest in keeping the pantry-stoves edged with the cleanest at least half a hundred times during the day. James, of course, has been, and still is, much too busy with the affairs of the farming, to give thought to the operations indoors. It is a question whether or not he has ever noticed that the years in passing have added pieces to that first nucleus of our cutlery: the stout knife which at home was on neighboring farms assisted at the butchering of them; the park for market, or "the voice barrel" in the cellar, the lamb, or perhaps the mutton, and later through the winter the youngling of beef.

Cold pork, pink and white was our main dish when we were small. But now in that interval of awaiting his coming, we settled fitly in a chair at the window which overlooks the mill a red stream, and fields that roll back from the rim of the valley. "The boys" - the younger farmer, and Gage (his nephew) were plowing at the time in (treated) fields beyond the hilltop.
