A flounder is a small flat-



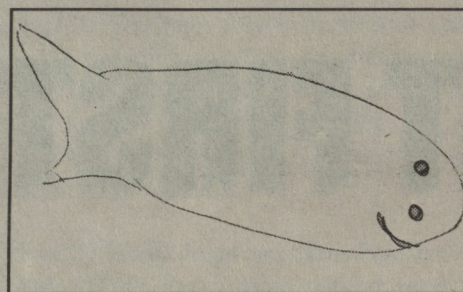

No flounders could be caught for comment.

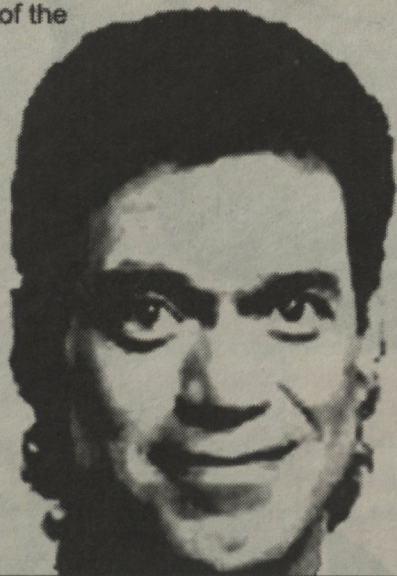
