TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

CANADIAN.

HALIFAX, May 24.

A despatch received from Canso states that the shore end of the new cable was landed at Dover Harbor by the "Faraday" at 7 p. m. yesterday, and the steamer sailed immediately, paying out as she went. She will lay about 500 miles of this type of cable, buoy it, and proceed to England for the deep sea section.

UNITED STATES.

EAGLE PASS, Tex., May 24.

Six citizens of Eagle Pass crossed the river to attend a circus in Piedra Negra. They had hardly entered the town when the Mexican garrison jailed them. They lay in jail all night. Ignorance was the cause of the arrest. In the morning friends crossed the river to investigate, and the Alcalde had the prisoners brought before him. No charge was preferred and they were released.

St. JOSEPH, Mo., May 24.

An explosion of 15 barrels Danforth fluid took place in a cellar in this city last evening. The floor above was occupied as a saloon and billiard room by a colored man, and a number of colored men were there, all of whom lost their lives. The number is estimated at from 15 to 45. Five bodies were recovered, all burned beyond recognition.

LITTLE ROCK, May 24.

J. Austen and B. Brannon fought a duel with revolvers about a young woman, at Cedar, on Sunday. Brannon was killed. Austen fled.

GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND.

DUBLIN, May 24.

Mr. Brennan, secretary of the Land League, was arrested last evening under the provisions of the Coercion Act and conveyed to Naas prison, County Kildare. The warrant for his arrest charges him with inciting to acts of violence. He was arrested for the speech delivered at Abbeylet, Queen's County, Ireland. He advised the people to pay no rent except at the point of the bayonet.

LONDON, May 24.

Prince Leopold, the Queen's youngest son, has been raised to the Peerage, with the title of Duke of Albany. Lord Hartington, Indian Secretary, replying to a question by Spencer Churchill, (Conservative), indignantly denied the truth of the newspaper stories that £25,000 had been promised General Roberts for his Afghan campaign, and that £12,000 was substituted when it was ascertained that Roberts disapproved of the evacuation of Candahar. Hartington demanded to know whether Spencer Churchill asked such a question on the faith of the statement of *Vanity Fair*. He answered, on private information.

The Times says up to last night over one thousand amendments, to be proposed to the Land Bill, had been placed on the order book of the Commons, and many more amendments have been prepared, not only by Home Rulers but by many English and Irish Liberals and Conservatives.

The survivors of the disaster to the British sloop of war "Doterel," blown up and sunk in the Straits of Magellan, April 26, have arrived at Lisbon. They are unable to explain the cause of the explosion.

Mercier's flour mills, near Portadown, Ireland, were burned to-day. Loss £20,000.

In the House of Lords Earl Granville announced that the Turco-Greek frontier convention had signed an agreement to-day.

Hon. W. J. Ritchie, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of the Dominion of Canada, has been knighted.

A deputation of the Anglo-Jewish Association had an interview with Granville, who said that knowing how extremely sensitive foreign nations were in regard to interference in the international affairs he did not think it would be expedient to make any official representation.

In the House of Commons, to-day, it was stated that the government would have to propose a grant from the exchequer to meet the deficiency in the revenue of Cyprus. That question of expediency of obtaining the sovereignty of Cyprus.

Mr. Seaton started for Dublin to undertake Mr. Brennan's duties temporarily. Joseph Bernard Davis, M. D., author of "Crania Britannica" and "Thesaurus Craniorum," and a corresponding member of the learned societies of many countries, is dead.

EUROPE AND THE EAST.

TUNIS, May 24.

The British Consul at Sfax reported a schooner flying the English flag coming to between Sfax and Ghentia. An officer from the French man-of-war Leopard boarded the schooner without permission and searched her on suspicion of carrying arms. The officer found no arms, but compelled the captain to give a guarantee in regard to the nature of his cargo, and afterwards proceeded with the schooner to Sfax. The captain has protested.

St. PETERSBURG, May 24.

The greater part of Pienak, in the Government of Minisk, was burned yesterday. Great distress prevails among the inhabitants, who number 18,000. Losses enormous.

Tenants' Rights and Water.

To the Editor of the Examiner.

DEAR SIR,—Your issue of yesterday contains an account of resolutions passed at the Tenants' Right Meeting.

The 7th resolution should by all means be insisted upon at once, the health of the inhabitants depending very much upon it. I would even go farther and, therefore, to a certain extent, disagree with Resolution No. 8. That no more debentures be issued for current expenses I would support, as they and the debt now due by the city should be paid by direct taxation on real estate. But I am of opinion that debentures should at once be issued by the City Council and the construction of water works be at once proceeded with. The Opposition party are using every endeavor, and even go so far as to threaten the present Government for passing the Act. But the Government or City Council need not fear the Opposition, and by taking this great work in hand immediately will, I feel sure, have the hearty support of all citizens, and in time, when real estate owners see the benefits to manufacturers, the increased value of property and the public health, they will come round and thank the men they now so strongly censure.
