

Three Double Heat Winners In Race Meet Halted By Rain

Abbeland, Lusty's Lass and Sir Chuck each won two heats of their respective races at the Charlottetown Driving Park yesterday afternoon before the weatherman once more halted proceedings for the remainder of the afternoon and evening.

It was the second time within three days that rain had forced the postponement of a racing card. Only on Monday and Wednesday nights have meets been held without interruption by the rain.

Yesterday's races were cancelled at the end of the sixth heat. Two heats were raced off in each event and in all cases there were repeat winners.

Abbeland, owned by J. S. Watt of Gaspé, Quebec and driven by W. J. Gardine, was an impressive winner in the 2.16 Pace. Sir Chuck reined by Earle Semple and owned by B. F. Steele of Bangor, Maine was in his best form this season as he won the 2.19 Trot. Lusty's Lass owned by Stewart Matthews, Northam and reined by George Sobey won both heats of the 2.25 Pace.

Bonnie Dale and Ginger Reynolds made the surprise showings of the afternoon. Bonnie Dale placed in the first heat of the 2.19 Trot and paid \$62.20. Ginger Reynolds was second in the second heat of the 2.25 Pace and paid \$33.40 for a place ticket.

Sir Francis Drake went into an early lead and was out front by about two lengths at the quarter pole with Frisco the Great second. He still led at the half way mark with Roma Budlong in third place and Sir Chuck fourth.

Roma Budlong broke on the upper turn after Sir Francis Drake had faded about the three quarter mark. As they headed onto the stretch it was Frisco the Great, Sir Chuck and Bonnie Dale. Derrick came up fast on the outside to finish third.

2.25 Pace
Lusty's Lass won the opening heat of the 2.25 Pace with Lee Cavallero placing second reined by George Sobey. Lusty's Lass broke leaving the gate and trailed the field. She started to move on the back stretch and paced around the field to tuck in behind the leading Lee Cavallero.

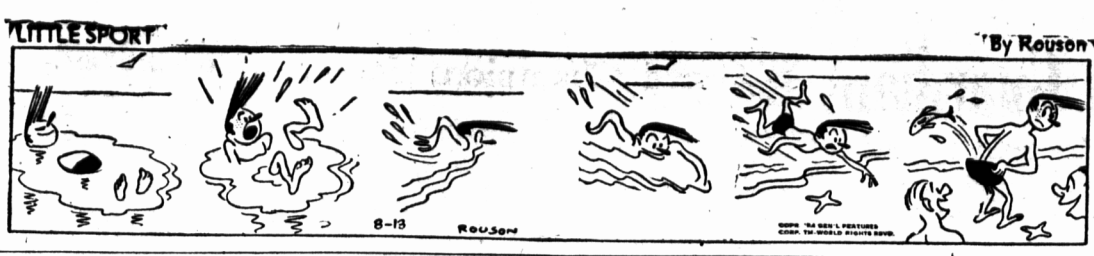
Sobey made his move at the three quarter mark to come down the stretch a good winner.

Six horses pounded down the stretch in the second heat coming under the finish wire almost abreast with Lusty's Lass again out in front by a nose over Ginger Reynolds. Others at the finish wire were Just Barbara, Mr. Jolliscott, Ethel M. and Vera Signal.

Lee Cavallero led the field for the first five eighths of a mile until Lusty's Lass moved to the top.

When Roger Bannister and John Landy, the four-minute milers met in Vancouver last Saturday, folks here got talking about Bright and the talk ended in bets. Bright said he could still run two miles in less than 15 minutes.

About 300 people—most of the town's population—turned out for the test. Bright galloped two miles along the duty highway in 14 1-2 minutes, pulled up a little short of wind and picked up the doubters' money.

NEW YORK (AP)—Before Archie Moore gets a crack at Rocky Marciano's heavyweight title in the hazy future, the 37-year-old ring gypsy probably will defend his lightweight crown against Joey Maxim in No. 4 of the series at Omaha, Wednesday, Oct. 6.

Truman Gibson, secretary of the International Boxing Club, was in touch with Omaha officials Thursday, trying to line up a definite date and settle financial details. Moore won the title from Maxim in 1952 and defended against him twice.

Capt. A.J. McCabe Wins Challenge Cup At Shoot

SOUTH MARCH, Ont. (CP)—Two Maritime marksmen won the shoot-off late Thursday at the 86th annual Dominion of Canada Rifle Association prize shoot.

F. G. Palmer, 47, of Saint John, N. B., pumped five bulls-eyes into the target to win the Macdonald match in a four-way shoot-off as dusk fell across these ranges near Ottawa.

Palmer's perfect score of 25 beat out three other marksmen who tied with him in the match proper Wednesday with scores of 121 of a possible 125 firing from the 300 and 600 yard ranges.

Cadet R. W. Brittain of the British Imperial cadets and A. J. Tetlow of the senior British team finished the shoot-off with 23s and Pte. J. J. Pearson of Montreal was last with 20.

13 BULLS
In the other shoot-off, Capt. A. J. McCabe of Charlottetown scored 13 consecutive bulls-eyes for a score of 65, before he eliminated 36 other competitors to win the Macdonald challenge trophy.

The 37 riflemen tied in the match proper with possible 50s from 200 yards.

British Empire Games Team Home

LONDON, (Reuters)—Triumphant from last week's victories at Vancouver, 60 members of the British Empire Games team arrived home Thursday, landing at London airport.

Champion miler Roger Bannister and the courageous marathon runner, Jim Peters, along with team manager, Leslie Truelove, did not accompany the group. They are expected back Saturday.

At the airport John Le Masurier, team coach and assistant manager, said: "I feel our team did extremely well in bringing back nine gold medals."

Jim Peters Leaves By Air For Home

VANCOUVER, (CP)—Jim Peters, England's courageous marathoner who collapsed at the British Empire Games, left by air for home Thursday under the care of Dr. Roger Bannister.

Peters, who has been recovering in hospital since his epic struggle to reach the finish line Saturday, looked pale and wan but was able to walk to the auto which took him to the airport.

He was accompanied by Bannister, winner of the mile event at the Games, who will look after him on the long flight.

Bannister said the marathoner had suffered no permanent injuries to his heart.

Although a Vancouver newspaper quoted Peters as saying in an interview that: "I think I've run my last race," the runner said at the airport he will decide later.
