Present council chairman is Rene Levesque, minister of natural resources for Quebec. Prince Edward's Island's minister of industry and natural resources, Hon. Leo F. Rossier, will assume the rotating chairmanship on March 31, 1964.

# O'Leary Credit Union Elects Officers; Declares Dividend

O'LEARY - The election of a new slate of officers and reports of a successful past year highlighted the annual meeting of the O'Leary Credit Union in Westport, N.S., held last night.  
The executive consists of: Willam Gorrell, president; William Smallman, vice president; Arnold Wood, secretary. The directors are: E. R. L. Sleson, Ralph Macdonald, Wood, Mrs. William Gorrell and Mrs. Preston Thompson.  
The treasurer's report, read by Elmer Boutler, indicated that the year's share capital was \$200,000 and that the union had a net profit of \$1,000.  
The willard Smallman spoke on the need of a membership drive to stimulate more interest in credit unions not only in Cape Breton but to the public. Willam Gorrell told of the educational work of the union and a dividend of four per cent was paid to the shareholders this year which is an increase of one and a half per cent over last year.  
John Matthews expressed the need for funding a way to interest more young people in a pledge plan they could begin and pay over a period of years.  
It was discussed that at the next directors' meeting, 12 to 15 delegates should be appointed to a meeting of the 11 local Credit Unions League slated for Nov. 23 in Charlottetown.

# Tignish Credit Union Reports Business Increase At Annual Meeting

TIGNISH - The annual meeting of the Tignish Credit Union, held last night at the Tignish High School auditorium, Wednesday evening, Andre Arseneau, president, reported that the board of directors, that there was a business increase over the previous year and that the fact that it was not such a good year financially for the community.  
The credit union boundaries have been increased and a substantial increase in membership is expected in the next few months.  
The small change on cashing cheques, he said has been discontinued and only members will be able to have cheques cashed at the credit union office from now on. January 1st said it may be necessary to increase the interest on loans not less than 10 per cent.  
Mrs. Roy Harper read the yearly financial statement and answered questions on the report. The assets of the credit union were \$313,149.27. A dividend of 10 per cent was paid on share capital. Mrs. Harper gave a detailed report on the annual general meeting held in Tignish in July. There is membership of 1,700 members. The credit union is under the leadership of 15 directors.  
Frank Arseneau, chairman of the credit committee, reported 73 loans were made during the year, totaling \$140,000.  
Patrick Hogan, chairman of the supervisory committee reported seven meetings were held during the year and over 700 verifications were sent out. "Edmore Arseneau reported on the progress made through the new income committee set up during the year.

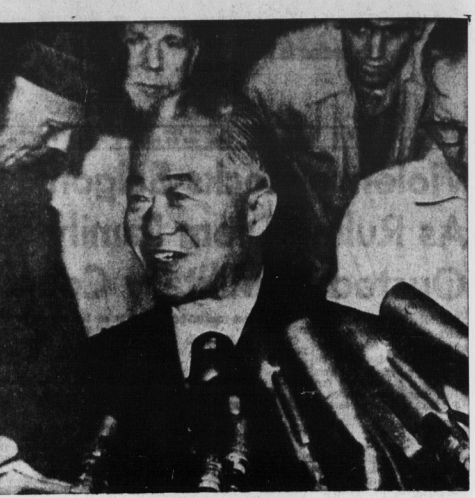

# Canadian Junior Red Cross Aiding Palestinian Refugees

Dr. K.A. Parker, provincial chairman of the Junior Red Cross committee, has just been informed that the Canadian Junior Red Cross yesterday presented cheques totaling \$26,884.84 to Dr. John H. Davis, commissioner of the UNRWA, at Charlottetown at 12:11 p.m. The gift will assist young Palestinian-refugees in the Near East.  
A cheque for \$25,000 completed a pledge of \$50,000 to provide technical school scholarships for teenage refugees at the Sibley School in Lebanon. This money was raised during the past two years by Junior Red Cross members throughout Canada, with the Prince Edward Island Juniors contributing \$2,000 towards this project.  
The additional donation of \$1,884 was made to the UNRWA office by the Toronto Branch Juniors. The money was provided by children attending summer day camps operated by the Parks and Recreation Department.
