BOARD OF TRADE.—The Halifax Board of Trade, at a meeting held a few days ago, decided to memorialize the Dominion government to have a uniform rate of customs duties on goods. It was shown that owing to discrimination Halifax merchants frequently got their goods passed through the customs at St. John, Annapolis and elsewhere. The Newfoundland question was also dealt with and a resolution was confirmed recommending the government to follow a conciliatory policy towards the colony and the adoption of a *modus vivendi*. The resolution showed that the balance of trade between Canada and Newfoundland was four to one in favor of the Dominion.

FIRE.—Another stable fire—the fifth since New Year's occurred yesterday morning. This time the fire was in the stable on Mr. Geo. Oller's premises on Sydney Street. The alarm was sounded about half past one. The fire was first observed by a young woman living in a house near by. The firemen were on the scene with their usual promptness, and went to work with a will. The fire, however, was well under way when discovered, and it was not until the upper part of the building was badly burnt that the fire was brought under control and finally extinguished. A stiff breeze was blowing at the time of the fire, and the sparks flew hither and thither in abundance. At no time it looked as if the fire would spread to the adjoining buildings, but the excellent work of the firemen fortunately prevented such a calamity. The building in which the fire occurred belonged to Mrs. Thomas Burris. It was used as a stable, coach-house and store-room. A horse kept in the stable was saved, but some farm implements stored in the loft was destroyed. The fire is supposed to have originated amongst the hay and straw in the loft. The origin of the fire is unknown, but it is supposed to be the work of an incendiary. The doors of the building were locked, and there was no person belonging to the house inside the stable after six o'clock. There was no insurance on the building or its contents.
