Can Dancer Repeat?

IN THE LAST 27 years only seven Kentucky Derby winners have repeated in the Preakness. On 11 occasions however, the third finishing second in the Derby went on to win at Baltimore.

It was Taylor's Northern Dancer won the Derby in record time 1:59, two weeks ago but he still won't be the favorite when they line-up for the start this afternoon. The third the Canadian-bred Derby winner probably is 2-1. Hill Rise looks like a 7-5 choice.

But generally, when observing other vaulters, Groom and Tredeick claim "different vaulters have strong points. You pick out their qualities and work on them."

"Unless for example," says Groom, "is a dramatic and explosive vaulter. He is very fast on the runway. He has a tremendous pole plant and three rock back, shooting up 10 feet over his hand grip."

The U.S.S.R. is always a formidable nation in the Olympics mainly because of the magnitude of athletes competing for it. Most of them are from the most landed continent. A fact that highly impresses Groom. "The Russians have 100 athletes who can qualify Olympics whereas Canada for example, has only 12 who can reach the standard." It seems almost inevitable that Alf will be going to Tokyo in October and he has no more of the credit to his coach. "In the past year, and a half, my receding years when I improved my performance tremendously and only the benefits will be seen within a year."
