Island Not Rescues Stranded Seal Hunters

ALBERTON — For the second time in little over a year a plane working with the Maritime sealing party was involved in a successful rescue Wednesday of hunters from Gulf of St. Lawrence ice.

Eight men from a damaged helicopter were facing at least two hours on the ice near the Magdalen Islands when they were spotted from a light plane piloted by Robert McLawrie of Craupud.

Although the extremely rough ice in the area had damaged the tail spinner on the helicopter, McLawrie made several hazardous landings and ferried all eight men to shore. The damaged helicopter was repaired yesterday and able to return to work.

The report of the rescue was phoned to last evening by Glen Matthews from his base of operations on the Magdalen Islands.

It was mentioned that plans for construction of new cold storage facilities in the province have been completed.

The government will prepare a brief for the Royal Commission on the presentation when the Commission meets in Halifax.

BOOST TO FISHING

In the Throne Speech it was stated that the government would "press vigorously" to support the development of the province's fishing industry "with an intensified educational program, by fostering new developments and additional financial assistance. You will be asked to consider legislation for the improvement of this basic industry."

Pointing out that a large part of the province's resource development program will be associated with the federal agricultural rehabilitation and development policy, the government will "press vigorously" to support the development of this industry.

TRIBUTE PAID

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P.E.I. Student Is Winner Of Fellowship

Barbara A. Ramsay, Hamilton, P.E.I., has been named a winner in the Woodrow Wilson Fellowship awards for 1968. It was announced in Toronto yesterday.

The award covers tuition and fees for the first year at a graduate school, plus a stipend of \$1,500 and dependency allowances. There is a further grant of \$2,000 to the Canadian or United States university that each successful candidate chooses for post-graduate work.

The awards are made possible through grants totalling \$52,000, from the Ford Foundation, and were announced by the president of the fellowship foundation, Sir Hugh Taylor.

Miss Ramsay is a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William Ramsay. She graduates this Spring from Mount Allison.
