Bye-Laws

TOWN OF ALBERTON

At a meeting of the Town Council of the Town of Alberton on April 22, 1922, the Provincial Automobile Act was adopted in toto, in addition to the following bye-law:

No person shall park an auto or

motor vehicle on the Main Street of the town between Church street and Poplar street, except and unless the left side of the auto or motor vehicle shall be next to and close to the curbing of the street.

Breaches of this bye-law shall be punished by a fine of not more than five dollars, together with the costs of securing conviction for the first offence, and ten dollars for each subsequent conviction.

APPLE CROP FLOURISHING IN THE VALLEY OF THE AN NAPOLIS AND NOBODY WORRYING NOW.

ANNAPOLIS, June 11.—Of inestimable value to all growing things in the Annapolis Valley were the rains which visited this vicinity during the week end, although their arrival unfortunately coincided with the date set for the Apple Blossom Sunday and greatly decreased the yearly number of visitors to the orchard country.

The preceding dry spell and the backward weather conditions had given rise to considerable anxiety among the farmers of the district with regard to the success of their crops and coming as they did at a time when the seeded acres were beginning to sprout, the rains will largely continue to contribute to their successful growth. Financially their benefit cannot be computed. They are termed by the farmers "Million Dollar Rains" which fairly proves their worth.

DECREASE IN THE COAL SHIPMENTS TO DOMINION

Strikes in the U. S. Coal Fields Affected the Export to Canadian Markets.

WASHINGTON, June 11.—Canada and Argentina were the only foreign markets for United States coal affected by the strike during the month of April, according to an analysis issued yesterday by the Commerce Department. Exports of coal for the month of April, the department said, declined by 473,000 tons as compared with March, the decrease being due mainly to the fact that shipments to Canada fell off to a very large extent.

NEWCASTLE, N. B. June 11.—Complete mystery surrounds the death of Leonard Hachey, a young man employed as brakeman on the C. N. R. Belgrade the Scene of Pomp And Splendor

BELGRADE, Jugo Slavia, June 11.—King Alexander of Jugo Slavia and Princess Marie of Rumania were married yesterday amid pomp and enthusiasm such as Belgrade had not seen since the establishment of the new kingdom. No untoward incident occurred to mar the occasion. Every step of the way to and from the Cathedral was marked by endless ovations. Artillery salutes at ten o'clock in the morning announced that the ceremony had begun and at its conclusion, as the royal party left the cathedral, the Queen of Rumania, smiling through her tears, was seen to bend towards her favorite daughter and caress her—a little human touch which caught the imagination of and deeply affected the simple people.

Inside the cathedral was a fine scene of magnificence. Representatives of all the states of Europe in gala uniforms mingled with ladies in brilliant toilettes and relieved here and there by plain dress suits and khaki.

The scenes outside were no less gorgeous and the streets were a feast of color. Three hundred thousand persons from all parts of the kingdom of Croatia, Serbs and Slovenes came to witness the marriage.

IN MEMORIAM

MRS. JOHN DONOVAN OF CHARLOTTETOWN PASSES CENTURY MARK.

One of the oldest persons in the Province, if not the oldest died Friday morning in the Charlottetown Hospital in the person of Mrs. John Donovan.

Mrs. Donovan was born in Ireland on June 12th, 1829 and that she had lived three more days she would have celebrated her 102nd birthday. She came to this province when a very young child. Mrs. Donovan, whose maiden name was Jane Bell, married John Donovan of this city who died about thirty-four years ago. She was a woman of remarkably strong constitution, and had enjoyed excellent health up to about four years ago, when, owing to infirmities of advanced years she entered the Charlottetown Hospital, where she remained until her death. She was bed-ridden for the past year. Up to almost the last her eyesight was remarkably keen for a centenarian. Her hearing was also good, and her mental faculties remained practically unimpaired. She had a most retentive memory, and could relate many interesting incidents of the long ago.

Out of a family of four sons and seven daughters, three sons, James, Samuel and Thomas in Charlottetown two daughters, Katie, wife of Frank Barry of Boston and Carrie, wife of Daniel McLeod of Rutland, Vermont survive her. There are also a number of grandchildren and great grandchildren.

The funeral takes place Sunday at 2.30 p. m. at St. Dunstan's Cathedral then to the Roman Catholic Cemetery.

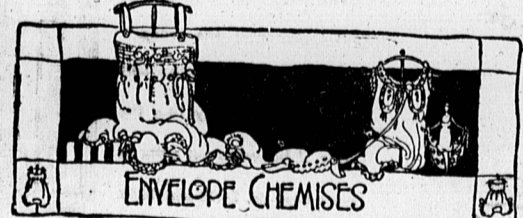
