

Cards, Cubs Battle For 12 Innings; Redbirds Win 9-7

You'd think St. Louis Cardinals and Chicago Cubs were battling off for the National League pennant, judging by their 12-inning battle Wednesday.

The Cardinals, who won 9-7, climbed into at least a temporary tie with Cincinnati for fourth place. The lowly Cubs sank closer to last place.

St. Louis' heroes were ex-Cub Jim Brosnan, who turned his first appearance against his former mates into his 10th victory, and Joe Cunningham who drove in the two runs by which St. Louis won.

In the only other daytime game in the majors, the American League-leading New York Yankees defeated Boston 8-5.

BROSAN HOT

Brosnan, swapped in May for third baseman Alvin Dark, pitched the final four innings without giving up a run. Cunningham tripled with two out and two on in the 12th. It was his fourth hit of the game.

The 3 1/2-hour matinee included just about everything in the book as Ernie Banks blasted his 43rd homer and batted in two runs to lift his RBI count to 114.

The Cubs made five of the game's nine double plays. A ninth-inning twin killing by the Cardinals, however, was the "killer" as far as the Cubs were

concerned. Catcher Cal Neeman opened the home ninth with a double, then was doubled off second on Sammy Taylor's pinch fly to Flood. That stopped what should have been a winning rally. Bobby Thomson delivered his 18th homer, and Tony Taylor bashed his sixth to effect a 7-7 standoff in the seventh.

In New York, Yogi Berra spoiled Boston's strategy by blasting a three-run homer off lefty Leo Kieley in the ninth to give the Yankees their victory.

Berra's 22nd home run scored Enos Slaughter and Mickey Mantle, who hit consecutive singles off righthander Murray Wall with one out. Kieley relieved Wall at this point.

The triumph reduced New York's pennant-clinching number to 10. Mickey Mantle hit his 39th home run.

LONDON (AP) — Australian miler Herb Elliott confirmed Wednesday he had received an offer of £38,800 (\$248,000) from a United States promoter, Leo Leavitt, to turn professional. Elliott said he expected to meet Leavitt later this month when he returns home to Perth, Australia.

"I'm anxious to get on home and plan to be home by Sept. 12," said Elliott after running a mile in 3:55.4—only nine-tenths of a second behind his own fastest mile ever. "I'm hurrying to get home but I may have to drop off in Sweden and Rome on the way there."

Will Ask For Vote To Expand Major Leagues

NEW YORK (AP)—The major league club owners, at a joint meeting in Chicago next Monday, will be asked by baseball Commissioner Ford Frick to vote to expand the American and National Leagues to 10 clubs, The Associated Press learned Wednesday.

The commissioner also will urge the big league executives to curtail the far-ranging radio and telecasts of their games in 1959 as a step toward alleviating the minor league's desperate situation. The AP was told.

In a special American League session preceding the joint convocation by 24 hours, Washington Pre-ident Calvin Griffith will seek formal approval of his fellow owners to transfer the Senators' franchise to Minneapolis. American League owners, however, are expected to veto the proposed shift.

Frick long has been of the opinion that baseball must expand in order to keep pace with changes in population potential.

Elliott Crashes 4-Minute Mile For Tenth Time

LONDON (AP) — Herb Elliott of Australia ran the mile Wednesday night in 3:55.4.

Brian Hewson of Britain was second in 3:58.9 and Zbigniew Orywal of Poland third in 3:59.7.

The crew-cut Australian's time was nine-tenths of a second slower than his 3:54.5 world record performance in Dublin Aug. 6. The great miler followed that by smashing the world record for 1,500 metres with a 3:36 at Goteborg, Sweden, last Thursday. That was 2.1 seconds under the listed world record.

Tony Anthony Wins Split Decision Over McBride

SYRACUSE, N.Y. (AP)—Left-looking Tony Anthony scored a split decision over unranked Archie McBride in their 10-round, nationally televised heavyweight bout Wednesday night. Anthony, who weighed 177 1/2, won the bout on a two-point decision. McBride weighed 184.

Anthony, 24, from New York City, sent his determined opponent down for the eight-count twice, but never had the fight in the bag, as the Trencen, N. J., product fought back instinctively. Judges Dick Albino and Harold McGrath saw the outcome differently. Albino was in favor of Anthony 8-2, while McGrath gave it to the veteran McBride 6-4.

The decision went to Anthony on referee Joe Palmer's vote. He saw the rounds even, but gave it to Anthony 7-5 on the supplementary point system. The AP scored it five rounds for Anthony, two even and three for McBride.
