Lobster Supper Each Day Is One Of Carnival Highlights

Highlights of the second annual Summerside lobster carnival will feature the delicious lobster suppers being served daily from 4:00 to 8:00 p.m. from Monday through Saturday, and dancing, fireworks, and drawing of a lucky ball, will be a regular part of each evening's program.

Monday's program, which will include the official opening ceremonies, is outlined in another item appearing in this issue.

Tuesday will feature a new car parade staged by Summerside auto dealers during the afternoon and the evening program will include a fiddling and step dancing contest at Civic Stadium.

On Wednesday the P.E.I. Highlanders will hold a reunion parade, memorial service, and recreational dinner. At 4 p.m. a soap box derby and doll carriage parade will provide additional interest, and harness racing will begin at 8:30 p.m.

Thursday afternoon will feature speed and motor boat racing, with six classes of boats participating. At 5:30 p.m. action will move ashore again with a baseball game at Queen Elizabeth Park. In the evening a wrestling card has been arranged with well known wrestling stars from Toronto participating.

On Friday a track and field meet will be staged at Queen Elizabeth Park during the afternoon, with some 20 events on the program.

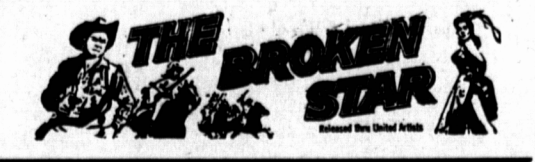
In the evening a stage show "Carnival Capers" will highlight the program beginning at 9:30 p.m.

Mammoth Parade Monday Will Inaugurate Carnival

Fourteen beautiful Summerside girls, who are contestants for the title of Sea Queen will be seen on floats in a mammoth parade inaugurating the 2nd annual Summerside Lobster Carnival on Monday afternoon.

Leading the parade will be a 1924 Model "T" Ford, owned and driven by Mr. Fred Haslam of Springfield and accompanying him in the 33-year-old vehicle will be the Mayors of Alberton, Kensington, Summerside and Borden.

The parade will be the opening event in the 6-day Lobster Carnival which will conclude Saturday night with the crowning of the Sea Queen. Each day will feature different bands, parades, sporting events and entertainment, with delicious lobster supper at Summerside Civic Stadium, a feature attraction of the program every day.

The parade on Monday will begin to form at 3:00 p.m. at the paved parking area at Willett Motors in Summerside East and at 4:00 p.m. will move off, West on Water St., to Central, North on Central to Notre Dame, West on Notre Dame to the carnival grounds beside the Civic Stadium.

The parade headed by the 1924 Model "T" will form up alphabetically and will be headed by the R.C.M.P., followed by St. Ann's Gaelic College Band of Cape Breton, and at intervals in the parade will be the Summerside R.C.A.F. Band and the Miscouche Band.

Delicious lobster suppers will be served in the stadium from 4:00 until 8:00 p.m. with the Y's Menettes in charge of the catering for Monday. From 4:00 p.m. until midnight visitors can enjoy the midway, Bill Lynch shows, rides, games, displays and a live lobster display. The official opening of the carnival is scheduled for 8:00 p.m. at the Summerside Raceway or, if weather conditions are unfavorable one hour later in the stadium.

Music by St. Ann's Gaelic College Band will precede remarks by the chairman of the carnival, Councillor Edgar Cannon.

An address of welcome by Major W.A. Currie, will be followed by remarks from Mr. Clyde R. MacLagan, president of the Summerside Board of Trade, Hon. A. W. Matheson, Premier of P.E.I., Hon. J. Angus MacLean, Federal Minister of Fisheries, Dr. Orville Phillips, M.P. followed by the official opening by His Honor T.W. L. Prowse, Lieutenant Governor of P.E.I.

At 8:30 a harness racing program will begin, and at 9:00 p.m. there will be a Scottish Band concert and dancing by members of St. Ann's Gaelic Band. From 10:00 p.m. to 1:00 a.m. there will be dancing at Civic Stadium, music provided by the orchestras led by Ted A'Hearn.

At 11:40 p.m. there will be a fireworks display at Summerside Raceway and at midnight there will be a drawing of the lucky ball.
