500 CANADIANS COMING HOME

Having Elected to Take Their Discharge

REMAINDER WILL BE DRAFTED INTO ENGLISH REGIMENT.

Artillery and Mounted Troops Will Stay till January.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER]

OTTAWA, Sept. 20.—The "boys" are coming home. Five hundred of them have had enough of campaigning and have elected to take their discharge at the expiration of a year of service.

The military here have received a cablegram from Lieutenant Colonel Biggar, formerly of Belleville, who is now Deputy Assistant Adjutant General in South Africa. His message was dated Cape Town, September 18, and states that five hundred of the first contingent will return immediately, the remainder having elected to stay in South Africa till the end of the war.

This means that about 350 of the Canadian infantry will be left behind.

It is likely that they will be drafted into some English battalion for the remainder of their period of service.

The artillery and mounted troops from Canada will continue in South Africa until their year is up, which will be in December or January by which time it is expected that the country will have been pacified.

A ROYAL VISIT.

The Queen's Thanks and Good Wishes.

London September 19.—The Colonial Office, in announcing the contemplated visit of the Duke and Duchess of York to Australia, says:—

"Although her Majesty naturally shrinks from parting with her grandson for so long a period, the Queen fully recognizes the greatness of the occasion which will bring her Australian colonies into federal union, and desires to give this special proof of her interest in all that concerns the welfare of her Australian subjects.

"Her Majesty wishes at the same time to signify her sense of the loyalty and devotion which prompted the spontaneous aid so liberally offered by all the colonies in the South African war, and of the splendid gallantry of the colonial troops."

Additional Disasters Reported from Newfoundland.

St. JOHN'S, Nfld., Sept. 20.—Forty two fishing vessels are ashore in the Straits of Belle Isle, and as many as thirty will be totally lost.

This is in addition to the disasters previously reported.

The shipwrecked crews, aggregating 70 persons, are being brought south by mail steamer, and a special steamer will go for the others.

Immense stocks of codfish have been lost with the shipping.

Reports of the loss of three more lives were received today.

Prof. Geo. F. Barker, M.D., University of Penn.: "All the constituents of alum remain (from alum baking powders) in the bread, and the alum itself is reproduced to all intents and purposes when the bread is dissolved by the gastric juice in the process of digestion. I regard the use of alum as highly injurious."

Dr. Alonzo Clark: "A substance (alum) which can derange the stomach should not be tolerated in baking powder."

Prof. W. G. Tucker, New York State Chemist: "I believe it (alum) to be decidedly injurious when used as a constituent of food articles."

Prof. S. W. Johnson, Yale College: "I regard their (alum and soluble alumina salts) introduction into baking powders as most dangerous to health."

AMONG THE BOERS.

Four Canadians Drove off Two Hundred.

OTTAWA, Sept. 19.—Major Brown, of the Princess Louise Dragoon Guards, is in receipt of a private letter giving an account of how Trooper Malloy, C. M. R. was wounded. Four of the Mounted Rifles were skirmishing when they came upon a body of Boers who opened fire on them. Trooper Malloy was wounded, the bullet entering at the right eye and cutting away the bridge of the nose. The Canadians returned the fire, which, however, soon got hot, some two hundred Boers potting at the little band. One of the others turning to Trooper Collins of the P. L. D. G. said: "Collins this is getting to hot, we must get out of this."

Malloy, who was lying heard this and said: "Don't leave me Collins, give me your hand. I will try and walk."

"You lie there, Malloy," was the answer, "and I will never leave you." Owing to Collins' refusal, the little band drove off the Boers and each man of the C. M. R. captured his prisoner. When Malloy was taken to the hospital, he astonished the doctors by helping them dress his own wounds. Trooper L. W. R. Malloy is an Ottawa lad, whose father fought at Windmill Point and his grandfather at Chrysler's Farm.

COLD STORAGE.

Sir Charles Tupper in Communication with Experts.

TORONTO, September 19.—It is said that one of the results of Sir Charles Tupper's trip is to find in the difficulties of farmers and fruit producers throughout all Canada, a thorough confirmation of well-known views entertained by him respecting the question of cold storage.

Sir Charles has been in communication with well-known experts of Europe, the United States and Canada on the question. The result is that Sir Charles is convinced that his views have the endorsement of the scientific world, and he is today completing a manifesto on the subject, which is said to be of vast importance and certain to command the attention of the entire Dominion.
