Montague Will Pave Two Streets This Year

The balance of the 1963 paving program for the town of Montague will get under way shortly. This will include paving of a strip on Fraser Street which will remove the one-way regulation with Kennedy Street will be completed.

This program will be done on the 60-60 basis with the provincial government as in the past. All seats are \$1.25 with reduced rates for children. Accompanist for the production is Christopher Gledhill, provincial director of music.

The completion of this program is expected to cost the town between \$2,000 and \$3,000.

The decision to complete the program was reached at the meeting of the town council last night. Present for the meeting were Councillors Greene, Reid, Jags and MacLure. Mayor B. H. Yeo presided and G. Arnold Wrightman, town clerk, read the minutes and presented the statement for the month.

During the business portion of the meeting it was decided to make office space available for rent. It was the opinion of the council that this heated office space would be ideal for the Kings County agricultural representative and it was pointed out

that an invitation had been extended to him and a request to the department of agriculture to have him located here.

In correspondence two letters of thanks were read, one from Premier Shaw and one from the minister of education, Dr. George Dewar, which expressed their thanks to the mayor and council for hospitably shown to them during the recent visit of the premier and his council.

The police report presented by the town policeman, Ed. Downe showed that one dog had been destroyed and that \$68.30 had been collected in fines.
