London Illustrated.—The first of a series of lectures instituted by the teachers of Upper Prince Street School was given last night by Rev. T. F. Fullerton, the subject being London. The lecture was illustrated by a number of splendid stereoscopic pictures. A large audience was present, and the lecture was much enjoyed.

Agricultural Meeting.—A very well attended meeting of farmers was held at Montague Bridge last night, when addresses were made by Messrs Robertson, Blair and Petrick. The Willard Memorial Service.—In the First Methodist Church lecture room last evening a Memorial Service was held for the late Miss Frances Willard. The service was conducted by the Rev. O. B. Emery, Messrs. Campbell, Sutherland, Corey and Kirby also taking part. A resolution of appreciation and sympathy was submitted on behalf of the W. C. T. U. of this Province.

Police Court.—John McInnis and James Savidant, for having a friendly bit of a turn-up in the market yesterday, were fined \$1.00 or 4 days each by His Honor as a warning not to fight in public places. Edward White, who with several other brave companions assaulted Policeman Hooper on Wednesday last, while making an arrest, had his manly independence rewarded by a sentence of three months imprisonment with hard labor cracking stones instead of beating "coppers." His accomplices are not caught yet. One drunk, whom the police are almost tired of, was fined \$20 or 30 days.

The Stanley.—The steamer Stanley managed to get within one mile of the block-house light, and arrived there, began to discharge her cargo last evening. The passengers were all driven to town. To-day truckmen are busily engaged hauling freight to and from the steamer, the distance from town being about three miles. This is somewhat better than the condition of affairs at Georgetown, where freight had to be hauled seven miles. The coal will hardly be able to leave before Monday morning, as to-day's storm is delaying the truckmen and the track on the ice is very bad. The Stanley will be kept on this route if it is at all practicable but it is thought that a change of wind to the southwest will send the ice this way and so prevent her coming, in which case she will go to Georgetown. The officers of the boat report that only about six miles of ice was met with yesterday until off St. Peter's Island bar, where the hard work began, and it took the steamer all her afternoon to get to her present position.

On Sunday there died in Cannes, France, a distinguished Canadian lady, who once filled a prominent political position in Canada. She was Lady Hortense Cartier, widow of Sir George Etienne Cartier the famous French Conservative leader of Canada. She survived her husband by twenty-five years and was 70 years old when called to her long rest, and died on the day preceding her birthday. She belonged to the Fabre family and was a sister of the late Archbishop Fabre and of Hon. Hector Fabre, Guardian Commissioner in Paris. The deceased lady was in receipt of a pension of \$1200 per annum from the Dominion Parliament. Her mother, Mrs. Fabre, aged 86, still survives and lives in Montreal.
