# Rainy Introduces Lions Club Tartan

Lonlon came to the fore on a province-wide scale at the Charlottetown Hotel Saturday night when upwards of 200 Lions and their guests, representing the eight clubs P.E.I., from Souris in the east to O'Leary in the west, held a mass regional rally in the form of a dance and buffet supper.

Marking the occasion of the 10th anniversary of the Lions in the 'Golden Province', the rally also provided members an opportunity to meet and entertain their district governor of 41-NI, Colin MacKay of Oromocto, N.B. District Governor McKay is making his annual visitation to all Lions clubs in the P.E.I. region, accompanied by Mrs. MacKay, District Secretary, Mrs. E. "Buck" Douglas and Mrs. Douglas, also of the Oromocto Lions Club.

The district governor's party, accompanied by International Councillor Eric Jessome and a Mrs. Jessome of the Kensington Lions Club, caused a sensation when they arrived at the function wearing a newly-devised color tartan of lion's exquisites color and pattern.

All three ladies wore tartan skirts and berets, white blouses and diagonal shoulder to waist tartan sashes, and tartan earrings. The men wore purple and gold bolero jackets, tartan waist cummerbunds and tartan bow ties, topped off with their purple and gold 11 or 2 caps. Their unique and eye-catching dress was the subject of conversation and inspection throughout the evening.

The new tartan, which it is hoped will shortly be authorized by Lions International as the official tartan, was devised by the Oromocto Lions Club and designed and woven by Miss Patricia Jenkins, owner of Leontroffers of Gagetown, N.B., who is also the designer of the Royal Air Force tartan, the New Brunswick tartan, and the City of Fredericton tartan.

The Lions tartan colors, five in all, were specifically chosen and combined to signify the following: Purple and gold, representing the Lions' motto of "darkness (the blind) and education out of ignorance."

WAREHOUSE DAMAGED  
NEWCASTLE, N.B. (CP) — Damage was estimated at \$75,000 after a fire in the Atlantic Wholesalers (Eastern) Limited building on Mitchell Street Saturday afternoon.

The fire originated on the second floor of the 6 by 160-foot three-storey structure. Although the cause has not been officially determined, it was believed possibly caused by a short circuit.

Fire Chief Leonard J. Burns said the sprinkler system, automatically set off by the fire, put out most of it.

Chief Burns said actual fire damage was small but the damage caused by water and smoke would be considerable. The firm handles produce, tobacco and groceries.

# Police Dept. Changes To Be Discussed Today

Changes impending in the police department following the resignation of Police Chief Charles MacArthur will be announced at a special meeting of City Council scheduled for this afternoon.

The police committee, under chairman William R. MacNeill, met Saturday to prepare recommendations for proposed changes and will bring a report before Council at today's session.

The committee, headed by Mayor H. E. Hyndman, will discuss the resignation of Police Chief Charles MacArthur, who has resigned his position effective last Monday. During a discussion on an application by the Hennessy Funeral Home, Mr. Hyndman said he had no intention of moving the place of business from the present location to the Albert Street location to the Albert Street location.

The proposed new location of the home is in a restricted zone and various efforts to get permission to move there have been in progress for several months. The committee amended the zoning by-law relating to the territory to remove a clause which prohibited commercial enterprises unless agreement of landowners along the street was obtained.

It was found this particular clause applied only to the Longwood Avenue area and was not applicable to any other zoned district.

# Hazlebrook Highway Crash Said Due To Icy Pavement

As the result of a highway accident on the Hazlebrook district about 2 p.m. yesterday, two young Charlottetown men were taken to the Charlottetown Hospital.

Gordon Rananah, son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Rananah, 21 Upper Queen Street, said he had been the driver of the car, is reported to have suffered minor injuries consisting mainly of cuts and bruises. His passenger, whose name is given only as Arsenault of Charlottetown, also received minor injuries.

Rananah and Arsenault were treated by Dr. R.L. Burge, and the former was detained by hospital authorities for observation while the latter was treated in the outpatient department and permitted to go home.

Icy pavement is reported to have been the main contributing factor to the accident, in which the Rananah vehicle, travelling east on the Trans-Canada Highway, collided with another vehicle and slid off the highway striking a telephone pole.

The accident was investigated by the Charlottetown detachment RCMP and two injured men were brought to the hospital by MacElnair's ambulance.

# Two Plead Not Guilty

Two Charlottetown men, William T. Giddings and Elmer A. Doucette, charged with theft of a car, pleaded not guilty and were remanded to Jan. 22 at Magistrate's Court this morning.

Giddings is represented by Lester O'Donnell, while Doucette did not have counsel.

Ernest Francis Larter, Charlottetown, represented by Lester O'Donnell, had his charge of turning in false fire insurance receipts dismissed for insufficient evidence.

Richard MacKinnon, Charlottetown, charged with disorderly conduct, was remanded to Jan. 22. Alison Gillis is acting as counsel.

Charged with speeding, Roger Sellick, Charlottetown, was fined \$10 and costs or five days.

Tofy Zakem, Charlottetown, charged with vagrancy, was remanded to Jan. 21. One drunk and incapable was fined \$30 and costs or five days while another was committed to Riverside Hospital, to round out the docket.

# N.S. Resident Loses Life In N.H. Fire

MANCHESTER, N.H. (AP) — A crippled visitor from Nova Scotia died Sunday in an early morning fire in which five families lost their homes. Five persons were injured.

The body of Daniel Doucette, 23, of Castle Bay, N.S., was found after the fire on the top floor of the four-story, wooden apartment on the west side. Doucette was able to walk only with crutches.

Fire Chief Edward Grady said the fire apparently was started by a flooded oil stove in the second-floor flat of the Otis Chase family. The family includes father, mother and seven children ranging in age from one to nine.

Three of the family were taken to hospital suffering from burns. They were Stephen Burns, 3, Durien, 5, and Otis Chase, 4.

The fourth person taken to hospital was Mrs. Catherine Bernard, 36, from the third floor after she fell and fractured a hip.

# 3 Persons Die In B.C. Fire

CAMPBELL RIVER, B.C. (CP) — Fire Chief Oscar Thiel said Sunday he is "inclined to think" that a fire which destroyed the 40-room Willow Hotel Saturday could have been started by someone smoking in bed or by an electrical fan.

Three persons died in the fire. Firemen said they recovered three badly-charred bodies.

Police said every known technique will be used to identify the dead. The hotel register was destroyed.

# Presque Isle Has Heavy Fire Loss

PRESQUE ISLE, Me. (AP) — A fire whipped through a building of business establishments in this town near the New Brunswick border early Sunday, causing damage estimated by fire chief Cecil Maccready at nearly \$100,000.

The blaze destroyed the Porter block, a three-storey frame building containing stores, offices and apartments, the chief said.
